PRIZE COMPETITION ON THE SCHOOL FAIR

The following composition written by an Alberton School girl of 13 wins the prize offered by Rev. George Millar for the best composition on the School Fair held in Alberton last October. On Friday, October 4th, 1918, eight schools, namely Alberton, Alberton South, Hillariver, Alma, Montrose, South Kildare and Central Kildare assembled together at the Regal Rink in Alberton to hold the school fair, for which all the pupils had been working and planning for some time. The rink was nicely decorated for the occasion with maple leaves running spruce, evergreens, flags and bunting. Along the walls were mottoes bearing the inscriptions, "One flag, one fleet, one throne," and "P. E. I. forever" etc. The Red Cross booth was decorated with the bunting and the flags of the Allies, besides Maple leaves and two big red crosses, it looked most attractive. All morning the pupils of the various schools kept coming in bringing their exhibits, and by noon everything was in order and the tables all arranged. There was a great display. Many kinds of vegetables, including beets, carrots, potatoes, cabbages, pumpkins and tomatoes were in evidence on the tables nearest the door, while the fruit—apples and plums—were excellent. On another table were corn, grain, wheat and oats in sheaf—and vegetable seeds. The little boys had a table of milking stools and hammer handles, which were wonderfully made considering the age of the boys. The fancy work table was perhaps the prettiest of all, on which were crocheted yokes, edging, and insertions, embroidered linens, hemstitched towels and dainty aprons. Knitted and darned socks also had a place on this table. The school-work table was very interesting too; some of the schools had collections of noxious weeds and tree leaves mounted on stiff paper and correctly named, while others had weed seeds bottled and named, contained in standard weed seed boxes. The children themselves took writing, drawings of the map of Prince Edward Island, fruit and animals; neat exercise books were also exhibited. There were several entries of photography, which were nicely mounted on stiff paper. On the table where the cooking was displayed were biscuits, bread, oatmeal cookies and ginger snaps. The butter was also shown on this table. All looked very nice and showed much competition on the part of the "young cooks." The last table was made up of flowers and potted plants, the bouquets of mixed flowers and sweet peas were very nice. Poultry, pigs and calves were also shown. The Banker's gave the prize for the calves and there certainly were some beautiful big ones. At one o'clock the children all gathered together to partake in the grand parade. There were seven automobiles in the procession, two from Kildare decorated with flags and autumn leaves, two from Alberton South, gorgeously adorned with the colors of the school, three from Alberton, two of which were trimmed with flags and banners and the others was decorated to represent a Red Cross car, two Red Cross nurses being the only passengers except the driver, all the other cars were filled with pupils. After the cars returned the children started on their parade, Alberton school came first carrying its banner and flags, then the other schools followed each displaying a banner in its own colors. They marched around the streets to the beat of a drum for some time, then returned to the rink where each school gave its yell. Then Alberton sang its chorus, "Smile, Smile, Smile," which was followed by the other seven schools with their song, "The Maple Leaf" all singing together. The children then gathered in the

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The note head of a family or any male over sixteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in unoccupied territory of Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in the District. Entries by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. He may—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land a year of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of the land homesteaded on a farm of at least 40 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, or spot where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section in any side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Entries Six months residence in the land or six months cultivation. Pre-emption patent also 50 acres extra cultivated. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. District—Must be one six miles square or three years, cut in 50 ac or less and create a rough, scrubby or stony and, live stock may be maintained for six months under certain conditions. W.
