Unsolicited Gift of \$500,000 Made

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—An unsolicited gift of \$500,000 by S. P. Fenn, of Cleveland, Ohio, to the International Committee of Young Men's Christian Associations of North America was announced tonight by Dr. John R. Mott, general secretary of the committee. Dr. Mott said this is the largest unconditional gift received by the committee from a living individual. Mr. Fenn is vice-president and secretary of the Sherwin-Williams Company of Cleveland, and a member of the International Committee. He left the use of his gift to the direction of the International Committee with the following proviso: That \$500,000 shall apply to the Retirement Fund of the Young Men's Christian Association of North America, and that the balance, \$450,000, shall be used for permanent buildings of the Y.M.C.A. in foreign lands.

Scientists After Both Bodies and Characters
(By Dominion News Service)
LONDON, Sept. 14.—We are on the verge of remarkable happenings in the medical world for our scientists have discovered the way to alter not only bodies, but characters. This statement was made recently by a famous London physician.
During many centuries anatomists have known that the body contains a number of small organs, like glands tucked away mysteriously in odd corners he says. The old doctors did not know what these glands were. But modern science, with its insatiable desire for knowledge, discovered that certain half-witted children did not possess a particular one of these glands—the thyroid.
That discovery marked the beginning of a new age, for it led at once to question: What would happen to these children if it was possible to give them back their lost glands? The only way to answer was to try the experiment.
Than the miracle happened. The poor idiot child, with its misshapen features its stunted body, its lifeless gaze its debased character, put on form of nobility. Before the eyes of astonished physicians, who could scarcely believe what they saw, a man or a woman was created from something little better than an animal.
Would the miracle happen again? Or was this only a chance one of those mysterious whims of Nature which cannot be counted on?
Another child of the same type was given the same wonder gland and once again the strange transformation took place. The lamps of reason were lighted in the dead eyes.
The news spread swiftly round the world. This work of British doctors became the chief pre-occupation of a thousand laboratories and hospitals. Wherever it was tested it was found to be true.
That was the beginning. To-day it is almost ancient history. We know now that even the wisest man, possessed of the greatest brain must fall into dull witted imbecility if this same gland, the thyroid ceases to do its work. In other similar organs, if these organs are active and healthy, an active healthy mind will be the result; if not, criminal or vicious tendencies will be displayed, hence the new power of the surgeon to "operate on the soul" by grafting into the body portions of missing or weak glands; and hence, too, the new study of personality, which at present is but in its infancy.
Already for example it is becoming clear that a "weak" character is probably due to weakness of one or other of the mystery glands. It is a bodily matter which may perhaps be set right.
In the same way, a criminal tendency is now looked upon by many men of science as a sign of physical defect rather than of normal weakness. There are some men and some women whose bodies do not permit them to be good citizens, and what is even more remarkable is that there are some women who lack the "mind" of their sex.
The effeminate man the masculine woman are examples. Their existing characters are, in truth, symptoms of the physical infirmities from which they suffer and these infirmities can in all probability, be cured.
In the case of animals, at any rate, there is no difficulty, as by the simple method of grafting certain glands a hen, for instance, can be changed into a rooster of quiet, presentable appearance. She will develop a comb and wattles and abandon the ordinary life of her sex. Similarly a rooster can be changed into a hen.
Male and female rats have lately been "changed" in the same way, so that, in theory at least, there is nothing now to hinder the strong-willed masculine woman from obtaining the gentle, dependent character which is "normal" for her sex. Surgery has not yet dared so far, but that it will dare, and that very soon, there can be no doubt. For it is the business and the privilege of doctors to correct abnormality of any kind.
Thus, a man cursed by a cowardly disposition may be able to regard his disability as a curable ailment and not as a shameful lack of character. For it is already certain that both courage and cowardice are physical qualities. They depend, as all personality depends, on the subtle essences which these mysterious glands pour into the blood and with which they nourish the brain and nerves.
Changes of character, too, which in the past were so puzzling are now coming within the range of understanding and of cure. If a man's nature is altered it can be assumed in many cases that his body has undergone some loss of gland-power, either directly or as the result of disease or overstrain.
Doctors nowadays frequently prescribe these glands where good-tempered people have become morose or in which people of commanding personality have lost their strength. The results are often miraculous. Moreover, they are not confined to the mental aspects of the case. Physical health also improved.
When her glands are "corrected" the masculine woman develops not only a more feminine nature but also a more feminine appearance. For the influence of these glands is universal throughout the body, extending to every one of the specks of living substance of which that body is built up.
