THE Westfield Mass. Times and News Letter in referring to the death of the late F. H. Coffin formerly of St. Peters says:—A surprise to many of the townspeople was the announcement made Monday morning of the death of Frederick H. Coffin, which occurred at his home on Clark street. Mr. Coffin, who had been a resident of Westfield 30 years, was well known herabouts as a contractor and builder, having been closely identified with the growth of the town, in that time. Mr. Coffin had been ill with typhoid fever for two weeks and failed steadily in the last few days of his sickness. In his younger days, Mr. Coffin taught school, and in spelling was an expert, the latter fact having been demonstrated on numerous occasions when spelling matches were held. He kept well informed on current events. Mr. Coffin was a man of character and an excellent citizen. He was a member of Woronoco Lodge of Odd Fellows, Rebekah lodge, the United Workmen and Knights of Malta. He was also a member of the Methodist church. Mr. Coffin was of the eighth generation from Tristram Coffin one of the first settlers of Nantucket. Besides a widow, he leaves two daughters Mrs. Silas C. Pomeroy and Miss Nellie M. Coffin, two brothers—Erasmus Coffin of St. Peters, P. E. I., and A. K. Coffin of Westfield, and three sisters. Mrs. John J. Mills of Bay Fortune, P. E. I., Mrs. Mary A. Fuller of Brockton, and Mrs. Emily C. Sterns of Springfield. The funeral services were conducted this afternoon, Rev. John D. P.ckles of the Methodist church officiating.
