MARINE SLIP—It is understood that it is likely that work will be commenced shortly in the construction of the marine slip at Southport for which the Dominion Government have voted the sum of \$2,500. The slip is to be built on the Southport side of the harbor between the Hillsboro bridge and the Southport wharf, and it is intended to accommodate nearly all kinds of crafts, scows, dredges, motor boats and small sailing vessels. There is no doubt that it is a work that will be of the greatest convenience to the public when it is completed. An option has been secured by the Government on the land on which the slip is proposed to be built and already the survey work that is a necessary preparation has been carried out.
