FUNERAL OF LATE PASTOR YESTERDAY

Large Throng Pays Last Respects To Rev. Father Gallant, Beloved Parish Priest Of Mt. Carmel.

The funeral of Rev. Theodore Gallant was held yesterday morning at the Church of Notre Dame, Mt. Carmel, of which he was pastor for many years. The church was filled to overflowing for the service, which commenced at 10 o'clock. About 25 priests from different parishes were present and headed by Rt. Rev. Mgr. MacLellan, V.G., followed the remains to their last resting place in the cemetery adjoining the church.

The solemn High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by Rev. F. X. Gallant of Egmont Bay, assisted by Rev. John Gaudet of Bloomfield and Deacon and Rev. Urban Gillis of Wellington as sub-Deacon. Master of ceremonies, Rev. John Sullivan; Thurifer, Rev. Pielan McKenna.

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Death of Well Known Haligonian

HALIFAX, Jan. 5 (CP) - An outstanding champion of the Maritime Provinces, John Murphy, former Mayor and Halifax Commissioner and a member of the Nova Scotia Power Commission, died here tonight. He was 55 years old.

A native of St. John's, Nfld., Mr. Murphy was regarded as an authority on harbor control and administration, and was a member of the first Halifax Harbor Commission.

He came to Nova Scotia with his parents when a child and was educated here. After holding civic offices in Halifax he first came into prominence outside his adopted province in 1925 when he led a delegation to Ottawa to press for "Maritime Rights" and his activities in this regard were in part responsible for the formation of the Duncan Commission under the chairmanship of Sir Andrew Rae Duncan.

M. St. Denis Drama Adjudicator For Canada

(CP. By Guardian's Special Wire)

OTTAWA, Jan. 5 - Michael St. Denis, brilliant representative of the Modern French Theatre, has been appointed adjudicator for the finals of the 1937 Dominion drama festival. He is the first Frenchman chosen to judge the finals since the festival was formed in 1932.

M. St. Denis was trained in the school of Jacques Copeau, his uncle, Copeau's French group, associated with the Vieux Colombe Theatre in Paris, was subsequently known as La Compagnie des Quinze and was directed by M. St. Denis. He is now managing director of the London theatre studio (de Theatre Ecole).

George de Warfaz, the regional adjudicator, will sail Wednesday from England. His first assignment will be Jan. 25 at Saint John and then at Halifax. Later he will go to Quebec and then across Canada.

Full Attendance At Game Conference

OTTAWA, Jan. 5 (CP) - Problems relating to conservation of wild animals and birds, particularly water fowl, were discussed today at a conference called by Hon. T. A. Crerar, minister of mines and resources, attended by representatives of Dominion and provincial governments and other organizations interested.

The Government of the United States was represented at the conference by Dr. Ira N. Gabrielson, chief of the biological survey of the United States. All provincial governments were represented.

The conference is under the chairmanship of Lt. Col. H.H. Ritchie, chief game warden, department of lands and mines, Fredericton.

Six Executions Thursday Night

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)

NEW YORK, Jan. 5 - Robert G. Elliott, the lean, grey-haired man with the little black satchel, faced the largest task of his grim career tonight as New York State's official executioner.

Thursday night at Sing Sing prison he will be called upon to put to death six men convicted of murder, in the electric chair, unless there is some change in the present arrangements.

It will be his task to place the death helmet on each of the party shaved heads, to see that the victim is securely strapped in the chair, and then to spin the rheostat of death.

With about five minutes remaining for each-leading them in, seating them, strapping them, and wheeling them out dead-the job will require a half an hour or so. Elliott's fee will be \$150 for each, a total of \$900.
