Confident Note Sounded At The Bank Of Nova Scotia Annual Meeting

President S. J. Moore Says Business in Good Position to Meet Present Conditions

Mr. S. J. Moore, President of the Bank of Nova Scotia, in addressing the shareholders at the Annual General meeting held in Halifax Wednesday, expressed satisfaction on the part of himself and the Directors at the Report laid before the meeting, and stated that, despite the generally unfavorable conditions under which operations were carried on in 1931, earnings had been satisfactory and the Bank's liquid condition well maintained.

Mr. Moore then asked Mr. J. A. McLeod, Vice-President and General Manager, to address the meeting. Mr. McLeod reviewed at some length the profits for the year, and explained the changes in the amounts under the different headings of the balance sheet as compared with the previous year. He drew attention to the fact that the report presented to the meeting was the one hundredth laid before the shareholders, and also mentioned that for the first time the Annual General Meeting of Shareholders was being held in the Bank's commodious new Head Office building.

Two Outstanding Events of 1931. Mr. McLeod stated that, in his opinion, the changes in credit in Canada and the departure of British from the gold standard had been the two outstanding events of 1931 which had had a profound influence upon the whole world. After the abandonment of the gold standard by Britain, Mr. McLeod stated that the disposition of all types of foreign balances was now to secure gold wherever it could be had; but the sole source from which gold could actually be obtained in large quantities, after September 21st, was the United States.
