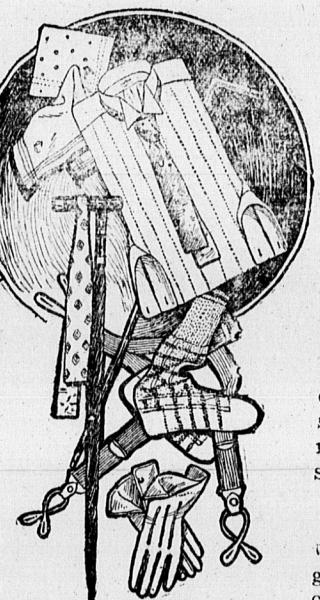

There was a fair attendance at the City market, Saturday, pork sold at eight and one quarter to eight and three quarter cents per lb, hay pressed per ton eight to eight fifty, hay loose per cwt. forty five to fifty, straw pressed per ton five dollars, straw loose per cwt. twenty five to thirty, white oats per bus. forty nine to fifty-one cents and black oats per bus. fifty to fifty-two cents.

W. F. Tidmarsh returned home from Ottawa, Friday last, where he gave evidence before the Fishery Commission. Other witnesses from the Island were J. J. Hughes, John McLean, M. P. P., Souris, Meddie Allant, Bloomfield; John S. Cousins Park Corner. These gentlemen gave evidence regarding the lobster fishery only, with which the Commission is now dealing. The consensus of their opinion was that when the lobsters show signs of decreasing that the season should be shortened. All were unanimous that it would be impossible to enforce a size limit regulation. Mr. Tidmarsh says that it is likely the law requiring the putting back into the water of live pawn lobsters, will be enforced this season. The great benefit of hatcheries was emphasized, and it is expected that others will be established on the Island in the not distant future.
