SWEDEN QUESTIONS

IMPORT OF LEAGUE IN WORLD AFFAIRS.

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 3.—The Swedish government has just published its reply to the inquiry circulated by the League of Nations as to whether the various members of the League favored a special pact for general reciprocal guarantees, stating that in its present form, and under present conditions, the government cannot endorse the proposal.

The Swedish reply says that as long as the United States, Germany and Russia are not members of the League it cannot be looked upon as having a universal character. Although the League has gained in power and authority during its three years of operation, it cannot yet be considered strong enough to deal effectively with the larger international problems which are at present menacing the peace of the world, and Sweden thinks that the guarantee system proposed would be of little value without the powerful authority that might come from universality of membership.

The government holds that if Sweden, with her stabilized relations with foreign countries, were to sign the guarantees proposed she would expose herself to comparatively large risks than those of the other states. It would be impossible, says the reply, for a Swedish government, under the present status of political unrest in the world, to propose to the representatives of the people that they enter into international obligations which might lead to military measures not compatible with Sweden's own vital interests and national independence.

Meanwhile the government repeatedly recommends previously made to the effect that compulsory arbitration should be provided for all disputes of a judicial nature. And it hopes that conditions may develop to such a point in the future that any disturbance of political peace will be considered the enemy of all nations, and that such a disturber will be punished by the joint action of all nations.

MICROSCOPIC WRITING

The smallest handwriting man is exemplified in the remarkable productions known to microscopists as the test ruling of Nobert, Rogers and Fassold and the test engravings of Fromont, Peters and Webb. A test ruling consists of from 10 to 25 separate bands of parallel lines ruled lines of each two successive bands diminishing progressively so that while the first band contains lines far enough apart to allow only 5000 of them to one inch, the last band of the nineteenth band test plate, is composed of 50 or more fine lines so close to one another that 120,000 of them could be ruled in a space one inch wide. These fine lines have been not only counted, but photographed, and thus actually proved to exist.

These miniature productions were well known to the microscopist world 50 or 60 years ago, but today they are comparatively rare. They are preserved in the cabinets of microscopical societies and private collectors.

The Scientific American publishes in the June number a description of an elaborate microphotograph for making the reduction of the test ruling. This was designed for the use of Mr. Alfred McEwen, F. R. M. S., who had made excellent use of it had the war continued.

The reader no doubt wonders what is the utility of this work. The answer is, mainly for writing wartime messages. When it is understood that writing can be engraved on any metal object, jewel or imitation, such as a mail in the shoe vest buckle, bottom, ring, necktie pin, etc. it will be seen how impossible it would be to thoroughly examine a suspect, who, on reaching his destination, could indicate the position of the engraving, making its exact location and deciphering the work of only a few minutes.—Scientific American.
