Western Guardian IN MEMORIAM

MR. MICHAEL O'HALLORAN
A link connecting the past with the present was severed by the death of Mr. Michael O'Halloran at his home in Glengarry, Lo. 7, on the early morning of Tuesday May 20th, at the ripe old age of almost eighty seven years. Despite his advanced age he was a remarkably bright and active man retaining all his faculties until the last moment of life. His actual illness was of three weeks duration, but prior to that time the infirmities of old age were ravishly sowing on his weakened frame and an attack of a slight cold put an end to a life that had been one continual act of devotion and kindness to his family and friends. Throughout his sickness he received all the aid available to the best medical skill, whilst he was tenderly nursed and cared for by his family, who did all they could to alleviate his bodily ills. He was also frequently visited by his kind pastor Rev. J. A. McDonald, who administered to him the last rites of the Catholic Church. Realizing that his sojourn in life was about over, he awaited the call with hope and confidence, and when it came it was with a touch so gentle that those kneeling by his bedside scarcely knew that he had passed away. The deceased was a lifelong resident of St. Mark's parish, Lot 7, and belonged to one of its oldest and most respectable families. Only one brother, Benne, O'Halloran, Campbellton, Lo. 4, and two sisters Mrs. Lawrence Butler, Glengarry, and Mrs. George Kelly, Elmsdale, remain. Besides these he leaves to cherish his memory seven sons, one daughter Mrs. John Griffin, Loch Road, and an adopted daughter Mrs. Howard Doyle, Stamford, Conn. Mr. O'Halloran was a man of genial characteristics and generous principles. He befriended the poor and needy on many occasions, but was never ostentatious in the performance of his charitable deeds, which he looked upon as a privilege as well as a duty. Into every public movement for the advancement of the community in which he lived so long, he gave of his time most unselfishly with all the vigor of his manly character. Although a strong supporter of the Conservative party, he respected the convictions of others and was always on terms of friendly intercourse with those who differed from him in politics. He was a faithful and zealous member of the Catholic Church and his interest in the welfare of the church never failed. Accustomed to the hardships of pioneer days, deceased had attained a habit of industry, which coped through his life. By hard work and good management he, assisted by his good wife, built for themselves and family a very comfortable home. A prudent and devoted father he loved to gather his large family and neighbors around the family hearth and none could surpass him in extending hospitality and contributing to their enjoyment. In death he was honored in a manner that showed in no small way the high esteem in which he was held by all classes and creeds. A large number of friends visited his home during the wake and also attended his funeral, which was held Thursday morning, May 22nd, at St. Mark's Church Lot 7. Requiem High Mass was celebrated by the pastor Rev. J. A. McDonald, who also chanted the last sad prayers at the grave. While the beautiful sun glistened on the open grave, he was tenderly laid to rest beside his wife and two sons, Stephen and Edward, who had gone before him. The pallbearers were Thomas Doyle, John McDonald, Patrick O'Halloran, Benne Kelly, Eugene McCarthy and Justin McCarthy. To all whose hearts are closely touched by the death of this good man the entire community extend their most sincere Christian sympathy with the fervent prayer, May his soul rest in peace.

The Car Owner's Scrap Book

THE CAR OWNER'S SCRAPBOOK BY R. H. KASPER WEAK VALVE SPRINGS

The importance of the valve springs is frequently underestimated. The spring must be of the proper tension to hold the valves on their seats and must be strong enough to hold the tappets in contact with the cam at all speeds. If the spring is weak it will cause the valves to leak, the mixture to be drawn into the carburetor; if the exhaust valve is weak, the valve may be drawn open on the intake stroke, diluting the mixture in the cylinder. A weak spring may permit the engine to operate smoothly at low speeds, but at high speeds the valve may not close quickly enough, causing misfiring or uneven operation. All the valve springs on the car must be of equal length and of equal tension if good results are to be expected. A temporary repair for a weak spring is to place a few washers under it, but as the cost is so small, a perfect spring should be installed as soon as possible.

CARE OF THE UPHOLSTERY

The cloth upholstery of a closed car becomes dusty in a short time. Most of this dust can be removed by beating the cushions and then brushing off with a whisk broom. A vacuum cleaner will serve admirably to clean the parts which cannot be removed. Grease or oil can be removed by applying a solution of lukewarm water and ivory soap, with a clean cloth. As gasoline and benzine have a tendency to spread such stains, their use should be avoided. For cleaning leather upholstery, water to which a little ammonia should be added will give good results, rubbing briskly with a soft cloth when dry. An occasional light application of castor-oil, rubbed in well, will keep the leather soft.

THE BREATHER PIPE

A part of the automobile which never gives any trouble, nor requires any attention, but still performs an important function, is the breather pipe. In most cases, it is simply a pipe connected to the crankcase, and affords a means of replenishing the oil in the engine, which many motorists believe to be its sole purpose. The importance of the breather pipe is so great that the engine could not operate without it, as it keeps the air pressure on the crankcase more nearly the same as the atmosphere. Without the breather, the action of the pistons would soon compress the air in the crankcase to such an extent that the burning fuel in the cylinders would be un-

tube. The lubricant should be rubbed into the walls of the casing with a soft cloth, blowing out the excess. **TEST THE WHEEL BEARINGS**

It is a good plan to test the wheel bearings for side play at least three or four times a year. Side play causes excessive and uneven wear on the ball bearing races and excessive wear of the tires. If each wheel is jacked up in turn, grasped at top and bottom, the side play will be readily apparent. The wheels should turn freely without any noticeable side play. A good method of adjusting is to tighten the bearings, and then back off on the adjusting nut until the wheel will always come to rest with the tire valve at the bottom.

When working about the car, the hands become oily and slippery, and the tools become difficult to hold. A slippery hammer handle has been the cause of many a blackened finger nail. If the hammer handle is provided with a number of grooves, cut with a file, in cross-groove fashion, a good grip will be maintained at all
