VETERINARY EXAMINATIONS.—The need of more qualified veterinarians is being felt through Canada at the present time. A lot of horses are being used to the best of their health, and a number of veterinarians are attached to each army corps. The Federal Department of Agriculture has taken recognition of this and has made Special grants to Veterinary Colleges, and on the other hand the primary object of the act is to bring about an increase in their attendance. In the past, students from Prince Edward Island found it necessary to go to Ontario to take their examinations for entrance to the Veterinary College established in Toronto, but arrangements have now being made to hold examinations in this Province, and the Examination for this year will be conducted by Dr. Pethick in the office of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, at Charlottetown on Wednesday, September 1st, next.

tain the exact co-relation between weather and crops. It is interesting to note that Russia is a leader along this line of agricultural science. It is generally supposed that the United States has gone further than any other in investigating these problems and although she has expended the largest amount of money the information gathered has been more general than specific. At the inauguration of this work in Canada it was hoped that a common system would be adopted throughout the world under the Agricultural Institute at Rome but this was prevented by the outbreak of war. Mr. Mills has mapped out a system in conjunction with the Experimental Stations throughout Canada and is gathering much valuable information which, it is believed, will eventually be of practical value to farmers.

A QUEER ARMY

The water in the vicinity of the East Indies is so clear that the fish can be seen many fathoms below the surface. So many enemies abound to disturb the fish that they have a very odd way of protecting themselves. The mullet, for example, swim in schools of several hundred, and one would think that it was a miniature army by the way they go about. In front of the main school are scouts, usually not over half a dozen in number, which seem to be doing nothing but watching out for any danger from the front. At each side or flank are similar watchers, while below and above the school is as fully protected. If a sea bird plunges, the moment it strikes the water, the scouts about dive into the school, and they all scatter to its lower depths. If a dolphin or other larger fish attacks from in front, the vanguard retreats and gives warning of the danger. If danger lurks in the
