New Salvation Army Leader For Canada

A Cable received by the Chief Secretary from the Chief of the Staff announces the General's appointment of Commissioner George L. Carpenter as Territorial Commander for Canada, Newfoundland, Alaska, and Bermuda, in succession to Commissioner John McMillan. (Says the War Cry).

Immediately on receipt of the news the Chief Secretary called together the heads of departments at Territorial Headquarters and communicated to them the General's decision. Colonel Peacock commended the newly-appointed leader to the loyalty and support of the staff, and before the company separated those who will be more closely associated than any others with the Territorial Commander knelt together in prayer that God would bestow His gracious blessing on the appointment and upon him who will be coming to fill it.

Without delay Colonel Peacock sent a message to Commissioner Carpenter assuring him of the pleasure with which news of his appointment had been received, and the following was the Commissioner's reply:

Grateful for your assurance of a welcome and co-operation. My wife and I pledge our utmost love and devotion for Christ and Canada.

Commissioner Carpenter is at present in charge of the South America (East) Territory, with Headquarters in Buenos Aires. This comprises the republics of Argentina, Uruguay and Paraguay. He was previously Chief Secretary.

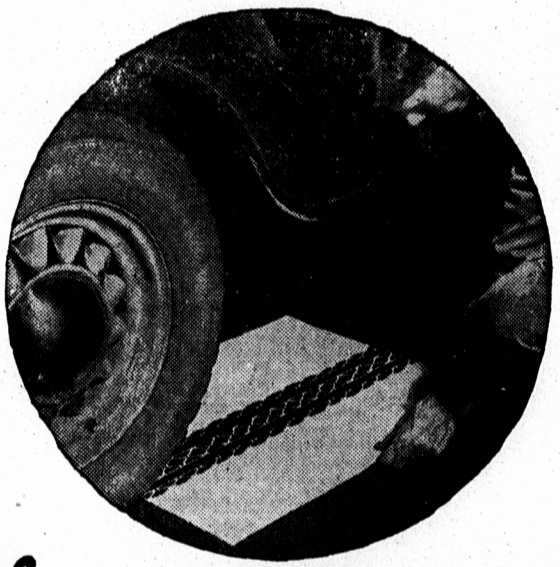
of the Eastern Australia Territory. The Commissioner, who is an Australian, served for a number of years in Melbourne as a Social Officer, a Training Garrison Officer, a member of the Property Department, overseer of the Printing Works, and Editor.

Afterwards for sixteen years he was engaged at International Headquarters first in an editorial capacity and then as Secretary for Literary Affairs to the General. In those positions he exercised widespread influence and performed work of far-reaching importance.

A return to editorial work in Australia for a brief period led to his appointment as Chief Secretary for the Eastern Territory, and to his elevation to a Commissioner's rank and the command in South America.

Mrs. Commissioner Carpenter was a successful Field Officer and a gifted member of the Editorial Department in Australia before her marriage. She worked in lonely stations among the Australian Alps, making perilous journeys on horseback in the course of visitation. As a writer, Mrs. Carpenter has won world-wide repute, among her biographies being those of the famous Angel Adjutant, Commissioner John Lawley and Commissioner T. Henry Howard. She has been prominent in movements on behalf of women and morals and has been an able worker in the Home League.
