THE QUEEN CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY

(Special to the Guardian) SANDRINGHAM, Eng., May 26-The Queen was 64 years old today and felicitations poured in on her from a wide circle of relatives, friends and admirers.

No public ceremonies were planned, but she looked forward with the King to receiving guests at Sandringham Palace. The press was particularly laudatory in recording the event.

One paper said that while she had maintained the best traditions of the late Queen Victoria, she had created a tradition of her own, a tradition of active, beneficent public services in which she surpassed all Royal predecessors.

Queen Mary was born at Kensington Palace on May 26, 1867, the daughter of the Duke of Teck and Mary Adelaide. She was first betrothed in 1891 to the Duke of Clarence, eldest son of King Edward VII, but he died in 1892.

She married the Duke of York in 1893 and was crowned with him in Westminster Abbey in 1911, on the death of King Edward.

This was the first time in several years that the Queen had spent her anniversary day in Sandringham House, her favorite residence, and always home to members of the Royal Family. It was a private celebration featured by the receipt of gifts from her children and grandchildren.

After reading congratulatory messages from many parts of the world, she took her usual walk with the King through the beautiful gardens and heard the bells of the nearby church ring out the honors of the day.

The villages observed the occasion by flying flags and extending their loyal greetings.

Interesting Event Expected Soon At Montreal

(Special to the Guardian) MONTREAL, Que., May 26-Montreal is expecting to have the honor of being the birthplace of the first child to be born into a Vice Regal family in Canada since Lord Dufferin's regime.

It is understood that Her Excellency, the Countess of Bessborough will come down to Montreal within a few weeks to be the guest of Sir Montague and Lady Allan and that she will later enter the Royal Victoria Hospital in July.

There is still doubt as to whether a doctor will be brought from England or whether Canadian doctors will be in charge of the case. Her Excellency's illness will be one reason for the Governor General's breaking the usual custom of making a western tour in the late spring or early summer.

On the New Testament, Dr. Falconer recommended the Dictionary of Christ and the Gospels, the Dictionary of the Apostolic Church, the Moffat series of commentaries, the Clarendon series. On the Fourth Gospel, Bible Class series. On the Pauline Epistles, the works of Anderson Scott-The Ethics of the New Testament and Christianity according to Saint Paul.

D. M. Baillie on Faith in the New Testament. Prof. Thompson named the following as useful in the study of theology and Christian ethics. H. R. MacIntosh-The person of Christ, John Baillie, The Interpretation of Religion; and the place of Jesus Christ in Modern Theology; the books of Eddington, Jeans, and Whitehead, Streeter-Reality; Sorley, moral values and the Idea of God; Humphreys the Holy Spirit in faith and experience; Wheeler Robinson, Christian Experience and the Holy Spirit; Carnegie Simpson, Church Principles; Karl Barth, the Word of God and the Word of Man; Emil Brunner, the Theology of Christ; Abbe Dimnet, the art of thinking; H. T. Stewart, a century of anglo-catholicism and Dean Inge, Christian Ethics and Modern Problems.
