CROWN JEWELS IN A CIGAR BOX

AKRON, O., May 30.—The curiosity of an American peace conference courier as to the mysterious contents of a cigar box wrapped crudely in newspaper was all that prevented the smuggling of the German crown jewels out of Germany to the former Kaiser, according to revelations today by E. M. McIntosh, foreign expert of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, who served as one of the American couriers at Paris.

The attempt was made by confederates of the former Kaiser, who picked the courier as the innocent tool, McIntosh declared in an address before the Exchange Club.

The contents, including long ropes of pearls, rubies and diamonds, and a platinum and diamond tiara weighing 2 1/8 pounds. They were discovered when then courier opened the box while on a train still in Germany. Neither President Wilson, Secretary of State Lansing, Colonel E. M. House, who were in Paris at the time, nor the head of the American Intelligence Department suspected that they were the crown jewels, McIntosh said. No one was willing to accept responsibility for the custody of the gems "and the courier walked the streets of Paris with the box tucked under his arm. Identification was made when a French jeweler was asked to appraise the gems, which he valued at between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000. They were then guarded by the Intelligence department. President Ebert was notified and the courier, provided with a personal guard, returned them to Berlin.

The courier said he got the jewels from a young German in Berlin who asked him "to carry the package through the lines, which to get them to a relative in The Hague, explaining they were his wife's."

X-RAYS THAT PASS THROUGH BRICK WALLS

PARIS, May 28.—X-rays pass through brick walls and have injured persons in buildings adjoining laboratories, members of the Academy of Sciences have just been told by Professor Contre-moulin, a radiograph expert. He advised that X-ray laboratories be completely enclosed in lead sheeting a quarter of an inch thick. It has been found, Dr. Contre-moulin said, that rays sufficiently powerful to be useful in treating cancer, have affected persons in rooms on other side of thick walls and in apartments above and below the radiograph room.

tries have been set aside, here in Canada practically the one Government has stood at the helm of the ship of state steering it through the most turbulent of waters, amid perils oft, and worst of all the "perils from false brethren," operating in our midst, and pretending to be the real angels of light. As most natural there was always, and always will be that foreign element amongst us, not in sympathy with the ideas of Empire, who will be opposed to our national movement, and likewise there will always be political adventurers to appeal to this hostile influence.

Perhaps our Liberals, Premier, objecting so strongly to Premier Meighen's claims for patriotic support, would like to have the Hon. Mackenzie King placed upon this pedestal of honor as the champion of Empire and as the patriot of the country's salvation from the Hun at our doors. It would be an interesting chapter for them to produce a homily upon his war accomplishments. In support of his claim a few of the speeches of his candidate Mr. Boucher, and their supporters in Yamaska, might be quoted, and more particularly those denunciations of Union Government with all the racial and religious element thrown in. And especially when the Hon. W. S. Fielding was denounced by their speakers as "a traitor to Sir Wilfrid Laurier in 1917," by reason of which "he lost the leadership of the Liberal party." And he might add their further boast, that for this reason Mr. King was elevated into the position by the Quebec Liberals. Yes, indeed, it might well stir up the souls of honest Liberals to listen to Premier Meighen's proud utterances in this respect, and well indeed might he appeal to the Empire living sentiment of the native born and true nation loving people of Canada, not to sacrifice this country for which the best of our sons fought, and bled and died, in order to cater to these foreign elements, and to put a few paltry dollars into the pockets of those who came to exploit rather than to build up.
