PROTEST HIGH DUTY.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—Protests from members of the Colonial Parliament of Bermuda that customs officials at New York levy excess duty on importations of Bermuda vegetables have been received by Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Curtis, who has ordered an investigation. Instead of thirty-six cents a crate on onions and other vegetables, it is said that the duty ranges from forty to eighty-seven cents a crate.

STRIKE IN ROCHESTER

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Jan. 24.—Following the vote last night to go on strike, over 6,000 clothing operatives this morning refused to go to their work, and only one of the large factories here is in operation. The factory-owners will hold a meeting this afternoon to discuss their plans and it will then be decided whether the factories will make an attempt to arbitrate or to grant the workers' demands. The organizers of the local strike assert that it has nothing to do with the garment workers' strike in New York, but is simply a movement to better local conditions.

FALLS FROM MONOPLANE, CONDITION IS CRITICAL.

RHEMIS, France, Jan. 24.—The well-known French flying-man, Charles Gaulard, was thrown to the ground from a height of 240 feet by the capsizing of his monoplane while making a flight today round the spires of the cathedral here. He was living when picked up, although in a critical condition. He obtained his pilot's certificate in November, 1910.

HOMES OF MINERS.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Jan. 24.—Warned by rumblings, twelve families rushed from their homes to safety early today just as large earth fissures opened under and around their houses, splitting some of the homes and crumbling the walls. The mishap was the result of a cave-in in the Bowley vein of the Dorrance shaft of the Lehigh Valley Coal Company under the houses.

TWELVE OF CREW OF NORWEGIAN BARK DROWN

GREAT GRIMSBY, Eng., Jan. 23.—Twelve of the crew of the Norwegian bark Arda were drowned when that vessel foundered at midnight of Tuesday off Spurnhead at the mouth of the Humber. Three other sailors,

the only survivors of the wreck, who were picked up by a trawler and landed here to-day, told the story of their sufferings. The vessel, which was bound for Rio de Janeiro, sprung a leak on Tuesday during a violent storm and her holds rapidly filled. The

crew took to a boat, which was capsized three times. On each occasion some of the struggling sailors were swept away and sank. TORONTO MOVE NOT TO START CHILDREN TO SCHOOL BEFORE SEVEN

TORONTO, Jan. 24.—The recommendation of Chairman Hiltz, of the

board of education, that the age limit of children entering the public schools be fixed at seven years meets the approval of Dr. Hastings, the medical health officer. "Chairman Hiltz is working along the right lines," he said. "It is a serious injustice to the child to place it under instruction at too early an age."
