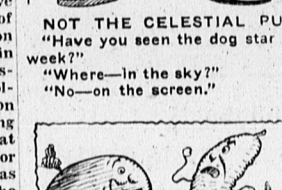

And, when she saw it, she felt that she could not leave it behind. She lifted it from its soft bed and thrust it into the tiny pocket in her hand-bag.

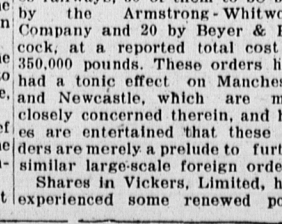
Then she sped softly down the stairs, let herself out into the garden, crossed to the garage, and took out her car.

- BUENOS AIRES BUYS FROM BRITISH FIRM
LONDON, Aug. 23—The heavy iron and steel industry of this country has been heartened by the placing of orders here for 50 freight locomotives for Buenos Aires railways, 30 of them to be built by the Armstrong-Whitworth Company and 20 by Beyer & Peacock, at a reported total cost of 350,000 pounds. These orders have had a tonic effect on Manchester and Newcastle, which are most closely concerned therein, and hopes are entertained that these orders are merely a prelude to further similar large-scale foreign orders.
