Yesterday morning on Supreme Court resuming His Lordship charged the jury in the case of John A. McInnis vs. A. G. Peake. The jury then retired and after an absence of about an hour brought in a verdict for the plaintiff for \$200 damages. The court then took up the case of Ernest Duchemin, an action for the recovery of certain rents. The evidence in this case for both sides was all submitted and this morning the addresses of the counsel and the Judge's charge to the jury will be heard. McLean, K. C., and McKinnon for the plaintiff and Campbell and Stewart, K. C., for the defendant.

The annual business meeting of the Charlottetown Baptist Church was held in the Schoolroom on Wednesday evening, Jan. 18th. The Pastor Rev. Z. L. Fish, occupied the chair. The reports submitted were of an encouraging nature and showed all the departments of the Church to be in a healthy condition. The treasurer reported that \$1917.98 had been raised for the general work, \$528.94 for missions, and the Sunday School has raised \$139.23 making a total of \$2585.25. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the treasurer, A. W. Stern for his untiring efforts to advance the work of the church. The choir also received the thanks of the church and congregation for their efficient services during the year.

A despatch from Toronto regarding the York Loan Company which had many depositors in this city says as follows:—Although over five years after the York county Loan & Savings Company went into liquidation, there are still 10,000 shareholders who have made no application to the National Trust Company, liquidators for the amount of their claim against the defunct company. The winding-up order was made on December 16th, 1905, at that time, or within two years afterwards, 114,000 shareholders sent in their pass books to claim the amount due them. An inspection of the books showed 25,000 shareholders with balances to their credit who had not sent in their books. In the last three years, of the missing 25,000 books, 15,000 have come to hand, but they are still 10,000 shareholders with claims aggregating roughly 60,000 whose pass books have not been sent in. If these people now send in their passbooks they will at once receive a cheque for the first dividend of 25 per cent.

CAPE TRAVERSE WIDE AWAKE.

A large and representative meeting of the electors of Cape Traverse and surroundings met in the hall here on the evening of the 16th to hear J. H. Bell, K. C., deliver one of his ablest addresses, touching the great question of reciprocity between Canada and the United States. Notwithstanding the gale of wind and the thermometer pointing to seven below zero, some persons drove distances of four and five miles and they were well repaid for the exposure they endured when they listened to

the silver-tongued orator present the question with force and logic in its different phases. Mr. Bell was not over sanguine in holding out too much promise as to what would be the outcome of the present negotiations between the Canadian and the American delegates in session at Washington. He pointed out the strenuous pull the manufacturers were bringing to bear on the Government in order to maintain the tariff on the same high level where it now stands, but at the same time he urged upon the farmers, whose interests he is wont to defend, to demand of their representatives pledges to get as large a reciprocal trade treaty as possibly could be procured without serious injury to trade and revenue.

In all my experience I never saw a public meeting composed of so many Conservatives and Liberals so unanimously in accord on any public question as they were at that meeting touching this question of reciprocity. At the close of the meeting a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer, to which he made a fitting reply.
