

Gordon Drillon Leads League In Scoring

MONTREAL, Nov. 20 (CP)—Three good reasons why the Toronto Maple Leafs are leading the National Hockey League were revealed tonight in the league's first official scoring list of the season, showing the Leafs' ace line of Gordon Drillon, Syl Apps and Bob Davidson holding down the first three places. The smooth skating Drillon, league scoring champion two seasons ago, is alone out in front with nine points, five goals and four assists, while his line-mates are tied for second place with seven points each. Apps has five goals and two assists and Davidson a goal and six assists.

Veteran Cecil Dillon, wearing the colors of Detroit Red Wings this season after a long period of service with New York Rangers, is next with six points while right behind him are Kenny Kilrea of Detroit, Toe Blake of Montreal Canadiens, last year's champion, Mel Schmidt of Boston and Mac Colville of Rangers.

Drillon and Apps share the lead as goal-getters with five while Davidson's six assists place him in front as a playmaker.

Babe Pratt of the Rangers, with 16 minutes in penalties, led Schmidt, Toronto forward has served 13 minutes for second place.

Other Maritimers

MONTREAL, Nov. 20 (CP)—The five goals and five assists that put Montreal's Gordie Drillon up on top of the National Hockey League scoring statistics, gave him a wide lead over other maritime stars now performing in the N. H. L.

The Toronto winger has a clean-out lead of five points over his nearest rival, Johnnie Desjardis of Chicago, who is tied with St. John and Charlottetown amateur, has collected a goal and two assists, while Wiseman, a native of Newcastle, N. B., has three assists.

North Sydney's Bill Hollett has compiled two points for Boston, with two goals and no assists. George Allen of Chicago, a native of Bayfield, N. B., and Bill Cowley of Boston, a former Halifax Wolverine, have a single mark each.

A close race has developed among former maritime point-makers now performing in the International-American league, unofficial statistics reveal.

Leading the race by a single point at the moment is Charlottetown's Pete Kelly, who has bagged three goals and four assists for seven points with Pittsburgh. Two teammates and an Indianapolis sniper are tied with six points.

Harry Currie, formerly of Charlottetown and now with Pittsburgh has compiled his six points with four goals and two assists; Montreal's Sammy McManus, another Pittsburgh star, has a goal and five assists; while Ron Hudson, a former Halifax Wolverine, has scored five goals and an assist for Indianapolis.

Two points behind the leaders are Crosby Sherwood of Providence and Jackie Keating of Syracuse. Sherwood, who hails from Saint John, has a goal and three assists, while Keating another Saint Johner, has two goals and two assists.

Springfield's Joe Lamb who learned his hockey at Su sex, N. B., has three goals for as many points while Lloyd Jackson his team-mate who hails from New Glasgow, N. S., has two assists. Duggie Kuhn of Truro, N. S., has collected one assist for Syracuse, and Windy Steele of Charlottetown has a goal for Hershey.

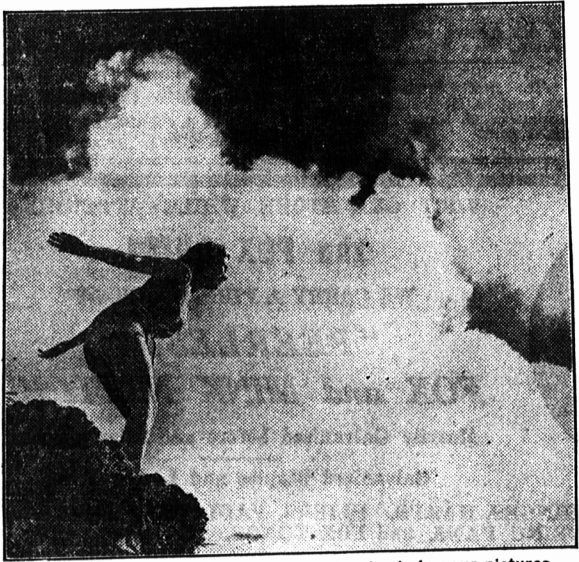

The SNAPSHOT GUILD USING FILTERS



A yellow filter—K-2 or "G"—brings out the clouds in your pictures... makes shots more interesting and forceful. The red "A" filter makes skies quite dark; is good for special effects.

DO YOU use color filters in your picture taking? It's surprising the effect these little gadgets have in improving the quality of snapshots—and they're worth a try for anybody who wants to make his pictures better.

With the right filters you can obtain more desirable rendering of colored subjects in your black-and-white shots... retain clouds in outdoor pictures... darken skies for dramatic interest... even obtain beautiful moonlight effects on water scenes in the daytime!

If yours is a box camera or inexpensive folding model, you should have a filter which is medium yellow in color. This may be described simply as a "color filter," or by the number "K-2." If you use a finer camera with anastigmat lens, you should also have a "G" filter (deep yellow) and an "A" filter (light red); but if you decide to get just one filter at the start, choose the medium yellow.

Each of these filters produces a different effect. The medium yellow or K-2 is a "correction" filter. Pictures taken through it show an improved rendering of tone values, compared to shots taken without a filter. Clouds stand out, just about as the eye saw them in the original scene. And all colored objects are reproduced more nearly in their correct relative brightness.

The "G" and "A" are "contrast" filters, for special effects. The "G" darkens a blue sky considerably, and is useful for dramatic renderings. The "A" filter darkens blue still more—so that, for example, a white building can be made to stand out against an almost black sky in a picture. These filters also lighten objects of their own colors, making them appear brighter-than-normal in the print.

Each filter calls for some increase in exposure, depending on the film you use. Instructions covering this point are generally packed with the filter, and are quite easy to follow. An exposure factor of 2, for example, simply means to double the exposure. This would be accomplished by using the next larger lens opening—such as f/8 instead of f/11.

Filters are simple to use... and can add materially to the quality and interest of your pictures. No camera hobbyist's kit is complete without them.

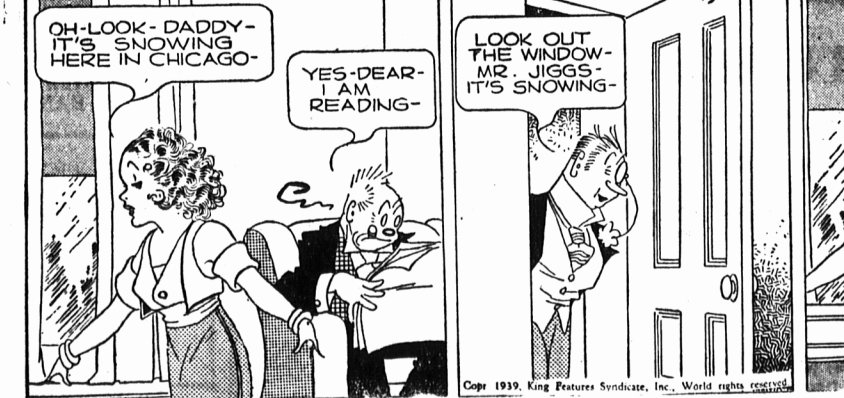
