The Germans are using a sort of rocket assisted glider which releases its bombs from a height and is directed toward its target by parent aircraft. A new weapon is used at close quarters against shipping close to the coast.

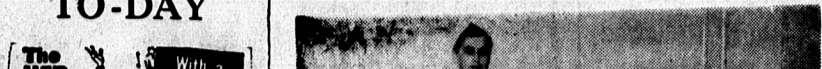

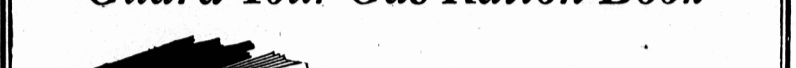

Guard Your Gas Ration Book

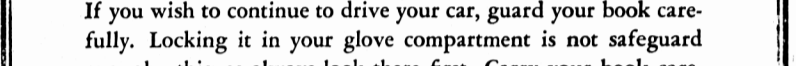

Remember—under no circumstances will a lost or stolen book be replaced within thirty days of the time its loss is reported to the Oil Controller. In some instances a new book may not be issued even after that period.

If you wish to continue to drive your car, guard your book carefully. Locking it in your glove compartment is not safeguard enough—thieves always look there first. Carry your book carefully on your person when needed. Keep it under lock and key at home, when not in use.
