Participated in over 50 Sweeps in first three months on "ops"—Was in Dieppe Show.

He was a Wing Commander last where he finally became a Wing Commander and Chief Flying Instructor at the Service Flying School, Hagersville, then, in November 1941, came his opportunity to go overseas. The story of his career overseas is told most succinctly by the citation which accompanied the award of a Distinguished Flying Cross after the Dieppe operation. "This officer is a fine pilot and a skillful leader. By his outstanding ability he has been mainly responsible for the high standard of fighting efficiency of the squadron he commands. He has completed a high number of sorties including some during the combined operation at Dieppe. Squadron Leader Fee has at all times set a most inspiring example."

MR. WALLACE MCLURE

The death occurred at Brackley Point on Dec. 19th, of Wallace MacLure, son of the late Hugh and Mary Bell MacLure, in the eighty-sixth year of his age.
