NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—After only 20 minutes of deliberation the jury acquitted Edward T. Rosenheimer today of criminal negligence in causing the death of Miss Grace Hough, by running down in his automobile the buggy in which she was riding. The case had been followed with close attention because of the wealth of the defendant and the attempt of the people to convict for murder.

### SYSTEMATIC HEATING.

TORONTO, Nov. 4.—Steam heating by districts, doing away with furnace rooms in public and private buildings, may be a development for Toronto in the not too distant future. For about a year or more a proposal has been before the board of control in the form of an application for a franchise from the Dominion District Steam Heating Co. Mayor Geary, Controller Ward and the late Mr. J. N. Kennedy were a subcommittee to look into the scheme, but the matter was not kept very actively before the board, partly owing to Mr. Kennedy's illness and subsequently his death. It has been revived, and the city solicitor was asked a few days ago to report on it.

### BIG PASSENGER LIST OF EMPRESS OF IRELAND

QUEBEC, Nov. 4.—Empress of Ireland left Quebec at 3.30 this afternoon with about 850 passengers. Among the cabin passengers were Major General Sir Percy Lake and Lady Lake, Captain and Mrs. Chapman, T. P. O'Connor, M. P., Thomas Skinner, J. P.; Lt. Col. Smart.

Frank S. Robertson, son of the late Peter Robertson, formerly of New Perth and nephew of Senator Robertson of Montague, was killed recently in the Tiro Mino, Gharcas, Mexico, of which he was superintendent. He was inspecting the telephone lines eighty feet down the shaft in an open cage when one of Peon's or Mexican natives lost control of a car on one of the levels, letting it go over the edge of the shaft. It crashed down on top of the cage, knocking Mr. Robertson out. He fell to the bottom of the shaft, a distance of 300 feet. Mr. Robertson was a brother of Fred Robertson, Brudenell-Exam.

### NO FATAL RESULT FROM LIGHTNING.

A fourteen-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Engelfrecht had started to do some ploughing in a field when a bolt of lightning descended and knocked her off the plough. She was unconscious when aid reached her and did not regain consciousness for some time. The bolt evidently passed over the hat pins in her hat, as her hair was burned and her scalp scorched. For some time after regaining consciousness she was violently ill and it was feared that some internal injury had been sustained when she was thrown from the plough.

### STREET CAR STRIKE.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 4.—Although leaders of the union motor-men and conductors expressed themselves as hopeful of averting another strike against the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company, the police officials today continued their preparations for more trouble with the transit company's employees. Mayor Royburn expressed the opinion that "out of town agitators would succeed in fomenting another strike."

### TORONTO CLUB SUFFERS.

TORONTO, Nov. 7.—A fire of unknown origin destroyed the beautiful home of the Toronto Hunt Club on the Scarborough Bluffs. With the house went many valuable cups and rare prints, and portraits which can never be replaced.

### POST OFFICE ROBBED.

REGINA, Sask., Nov. 4.—The news just leaked out of a robbery committed at Pilot Butte on Saturday last, when the post office safe was broken open and about \$500 stolen. While no arrests have been made, it is believed that the robbery was committed by local men well acquainted with the premises.

### LEAVES SIX THOUSAND DOLLARS TO FIANCEE

PROVIDENCE, Nov. 4.—Dr. Lenox G. Walling, a young and well known physician of Burrillville, who died last week, made only one bequest in his will, that of \$6000 to Miss Hazel Mae Wheeler, of New Hampshire, a professional nurse, who was engaged to be married to him next month. Since his illness, which began last April, Miss Wheeler had been Walling's nurse. When he was taken to his mother's home in Harrisville, Miss Wheeler accompanied him. The will has been followed and Dr. Walling's mother was named as executrix.

### A DESPERATE DEED.

SCRANTON, Pa., Nov. 4.—Mrs. Harriet Turner, 40 years old, shot and killed her 17-year-old daughter, Margarie, last night, and then sent a bullet into her own breast, inflicting what physicians believe to be a fatal wound.

A milkman today found her half buried in fifteen inches of snow on her front porch. Her head was resting on a pillow. Mr. Turner's husband, William, and her son, Willard, are in the University of Pennsylvania hospital at Philadelphia. The husband is in a critical condition from asthma and the son is being treated for blindness in one eye. The authorities believe that worry over her family troubles temporarily deranged Mrs. Turner's mind.

A 11 year old son, who was in the house when Mrs. Turner fired the shots, was not harmed. In a lucid moment Mrs. Turner told the doctors that she loved the boy too much to kill him, but she thought the daughter would have too many troubles in life and decided to shoot her.

### PIND LUMBERMAN'S BODY IN WHEEL.

MEXICO, Maine, Nov. 6.—Wedged tightly between the wheel of his wagon and the shaft, the body of Hiram Richards, a well known lumber and ice dealer, was found early today in the woods near his home by men returning from their work at the nearby paper mills.

The man's body was badly mangled and was held so firmly that the wheel had to be removed before the victim could be extricated. The cause of the accident is not known. Richards drove to Roxbury yesterday to see about a lumber contract and failed to return that evening. He was 50 years old and leaves a widow.

### POLITICS MAY KILL WOMAN

FRANKLYN, Penn., Nov. 5.—Word tonight from the home of Joseph C. Sibley is to the effect that neither the former Congressman nor his wife has more than the slenderest chance of recovery.

Mr. Sibley blames himself for Mrs. Sibley's condition, for her breakdown resulted from the charges brought against her husband as a candidate for the Republican congressional nomination in this district. She had urged him not to run. Dr. H. P. Hammond, who is in charge of both patients, says that two weeks ago Mrs. Sibley had a slight change of recovery, but that hope now has been practically abandoned. Her chief trouble is mental. She is confined to her bed.

Mr. Sibley is able to get up, but attempts to walk result in attacks of dizziness from heart weakness. He eats but little.

### BIG CHANGE ON TEMPERANCE

MONTREAL, Nov. 5.—Evidence of a big change in Methodist opinion in Canada on the subject of temperance was furnished last evening at the Centennial tea at St. James Methodist church, when a number of historical documents were read by J. H. Carson.

No member of this society" ran a resolution passed by the quarterly official board of St. James Church, on Feb. 26, 1840, "shall be allowed to agitate the question of temperance, especially in the extreme view of it called teetotalism of total abstinence with a view of making it a church question." Now a resolution in favor of prohibition is a standing order at the Methodist General Conference. At the same time as was passed the resolution just quoted, the quarterly board passed a second motion censuring R. D. Wadsworth, an official of the church, for his zeal as a temperance agitator.

Another resolution read by Mr. Carson was, he stated, the origin of the Canadian Thanksgiving Day. It was passed by the St. James quarterly official board on October 15, 1852, and requested the Governor of United Canada to set aside a day for thanksgiving.

### OFFICE CHASES MAN

MUNCIE, Nov. 4.—"Any party that did not have any more sense than to nominate me for the position of justice ought to see elected a man like Joseph Zehner, even though he is a Democrat."

### RIVALS SHELTON.

COBALT, Ont., Nov. 4.—Two Elk Lake French-Canadians have recently lost nearly all their savings through a Sheldonese scheme, whereby a Sturgeon Lake woman had property developed, and sold much stock into the bargain.

A number of French-Canadians having consulted an old woman fortune-teller living on the Sturgeon River at Sturgeon falls, as to the existence of gold on a property belonging to one of them, was told to put a shaft down in a certain place and they would find both gold and silver in carloads for the shovelling.

Two Elk Lake Frenchmen and two others from Sturgeon Falls, acting in this straight tip, pooled all their savings, hired a couple of good men with a drill at Elk Lake, and proceeded to excavate. They scraped up no less than \$900, and sank a shaft in granite at the mouth of Sturgeon river. The granite remained granite, until the \$900 played out, and the men quit. The fortune-teller says the gold has dropped some distance since she had her dream, and they must go deeper.

The Frenchmen getting wise to the fraud, are now selling stock in a company, at fifteen dollars a share and are finding many "investors."

### ST. THOMAS ACCIDENTS.

ST. THOMAS, Nov. 4.—Two serious accidents occurred on the Wabash within a few miles of here this evening, one death resulting and another victim receiving injuries which may prove fatal before morning. Two freight trains met in a rear-end collision at Corinth about thirty miles east of St. Thomas, as a result of the over-running of orders. Six cars were smashed to atoms and George A. Smith, engineer of the second train was killed. No other members of the train crews were injured. Smith was about fifty-five years old, having been in the employ of the rail road for many years, and is survived by a wife and a grown up son and daughter. No definite explanation of the accident could be made tonight. The other mishap befel Mr. Harold Oke, operator on the Wabash at New Sarum which is situated some ten miles east of St. Thomas. Oke and his wife were on their jigger bound for Aylmer, where they intended to spend a social evening when they were struck by a light engine. The jigger was hurled into the air and smashed to pieces. While Oke's two legs were cut off beneath the wheels of the engine, Mrs. Oke escaped with a sprained wrist. The injured man was brought in all haste to St. Thomas and little hopes is held for his recovery.

### AWARDED DAMAGES.

WELLAND, November 4.—A case of unusual interest was decided in the assizes here when Balthasar Kock, of Buffalo, was awarded \$500 damages from the Crystal Beach Amusement company for the death of his daughter. On the annual excursion of the Masten Park high school of Buffalo to Crystal Beach, Louise Kock, a young lady student, took a ride on the scenic railway. Just as the train was emerging from a tunnel the passengers heard a scream, and when the train was stopped the girl's mangled body was found beside the track. She had fallen from the train as it rounded a curve. The jury found that the company was guilty of negligence in that the car had no railings and was not properly safeguarded.

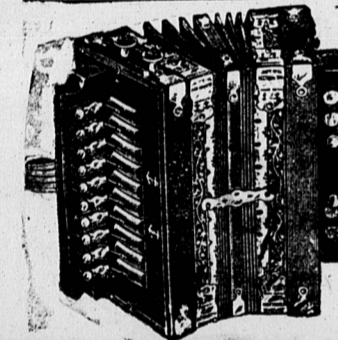

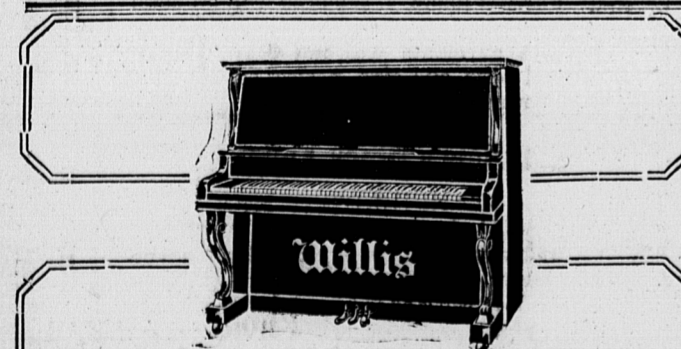

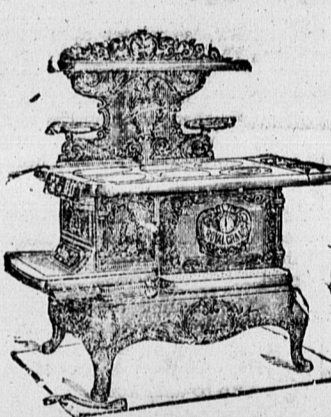
