Following is the address: LAC Malcolm Matheson, Pte. P.W. Cavanagh. It is with mingled feelings of pleasure and regret that we gather here tonight, pleased to have you in our midst once again, regret on learning of your departure from us so soon. During the years of your association with us as a student and friend, you have by your stirring qualities so endeared yourself to us that it is not easy to see you leave the Glen but we take consolation in the knowledge that wherever you may go or whatever task you may have to perform you will always do your duty serving your king and country. We ask you now to accept this small gift in the spirit in which it is offered not for its value but as a token of our love and esteem and in bidding you God speed we assure you that we shall not forget you, praying for the day to soon come when this cruel war will be over and our boys once more return to their homes and loved ones. In Memoriam

On June 8th, the residents of Hampton and vicinity were saddened when word was received that Miss Ella Wilson had passed away. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Bell of Charlottetown. Miss Wilson, who was in her eightieth year, spent practically all her life on the old Wilson homestead at Hampton. During her long, active life she nobly assisted her brother Robert and sister Fannie, both of whom predeceased her, in the labor and manifold duties required to operate the fine farm, possessing splendid health and vitality until an unfortunate accident in the winter of 1943 rendered her unable to continue her busy life. This misfortune she cheerfully and uncomplainingly bore always, grateful for the attention and ministrations of those in whose home she spent the last year of her life. Her strength gradually weakened until on June 8th she peacefully passed on, at the home of her beloved niece who so tenderly nursed her and provided the best of medical aid.

Ella, as she was familiarly known by her friends and neighbors, possessed a most unselfish and happy disposition. She was always interested in church work and while able to regular attendant and helper in Sunday School. For over one quarter century she was the faithful secretary of the Hampton Auxiliary of the W. M. S., an office which she faithfully and honorably discharged. She leaves to mourn one daughter, Mrs. Hector Kier, of Granville and several nieces and nephews, beside a large number of friends and acquaintances. Her funeral on June 8th was held at the home of her nephew, Mr. Warren Ferguson of Hampton. Her pastor, Rev. R. E. Vessey of the United Church paid high tribute to the deceased, while beautiful floral tributes from her family and the W. M. S. gave mute testimony to the esteem of the departed. The hymns sung were "The Sands of Time are Sinking" and "The Lord's My Shepherd." A beautiful solo "Only Shadows" was feelingly rendered by Mrs. John McQuarrie. The remains were tenderly laid to rest beside her brother and sister in the Cranau cemetery. The following were the pall-bearers: John H. Myers, C. E.
