LONDON, Eng., Feb. 19 (Special)—The underwriters are showing something like a revolt against the flood of new Canadian issues. The Times says that the present system has dangers in a time like the present, and urges that in the present conditions of politics and commerce, no new issues be undertaken except those that are absolutely necessary. Efforts are being made to conclude an informal agreement among the leading underwriters to refuse to issue further new issues until conditions are more propitious. LISBON, Feb. 19 (Special)—Advices from Mozambique, Africa, say that the notorious native chief, Napanza, recently raided the Nampula districts of Mozambique, massacring a large number of European settlers. The Governor immediately dispatched a punitive expedition of 1,000 men. After a march of nearly 400 miles in the boiling sun the expedition came upon the chief and his band and completely routed them after five hours' fighting, killing 200 and wounding 500. The Portuguese lost four men killed and 22 wounded. The victory is considered very important, because the region will be opened for Portuguese development, bequeathing the residue of his estate to his friend, Mr. Albert Edward Roe, who was present when Mr. Trevanion sank into unconsciousness preceding his death was exhumed by the Home Office at the request of Mrs. Trevanion. She learned of her son's illness on September, 9, and when she arrived at the flat at Hove she at once saw he was dying. She had been unconscious for fifteen hours. Before her son died Mr. Roe told her the flat, the heirlooms, the furniture and everything was in his name. "I asked him why," Mrs. Trevanion said, "and he replied, 'To get you out of my house as fast as you will.'" "I answered, 'Suppose I may make a fuss about my son's death?'" Mrs. Trevanion said she noticed Mr. Roe looking for something on her son's dressing room table. She afterwards found there an empty envelope which she had not satisfied that her son took the veronal from which he died by his own hand. BERLIN, Feb. 19 (Special)—Between the speeches, he has been so busily making during the past week, the Kaiser found time to arrive at the Kaiser's estate in Berlin for his only daughter, the Princess Victoria Louise, and her fiancé, Prince Ernest of Cumberland. The Royal lovers, accompanied by the Kaiserin, arrived from Karlsruhe, at 8.30 in the morning. Many thousands assembled in front of the Potsdam Station, where, by command of the Kaiser, four squadrons of the Zeiten Red Hussars, to which Prince Ernest has just been assigned, were drawn up with guards, for the escort duty. The Kaiser was wreathed in smiles, as he assisted the Kaiserin, and his daughter to alight from the train. He handed the Kaiserin a bouquet of red carnations, and his daughter a bouquet of yellow carnations. Princess Louise, who was followed by her fiancé, a tall and slender young man, dressed in a military uniform, in the uniform of the Bavarian Heavy Dragoons, looked very happy. She blushed with pleasure when the Burgomaster presented her with a bouquet of orchids, and addressed to the Prince words of cordial welcome to Berlin. The Kaiser, Kaiserin, Princess and Prince, then entered a four horse carriage, without riders, and proceeded to the Royal Castle, escorted by Zeiten Hussars. Large crowds, who were waiting in Tiergarten and Unter den Linden, accompanied the party a hearty welcome. The newspapers are pointing out that thirteen seems to be the Princess Louise's lucky number. She was born September 13, betrothed 13, and made her state entry into Berlin on February 13.
