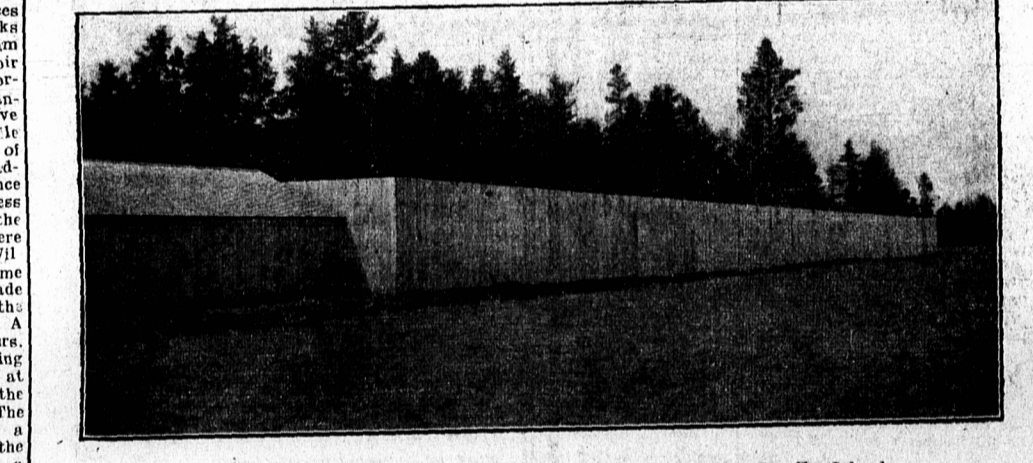

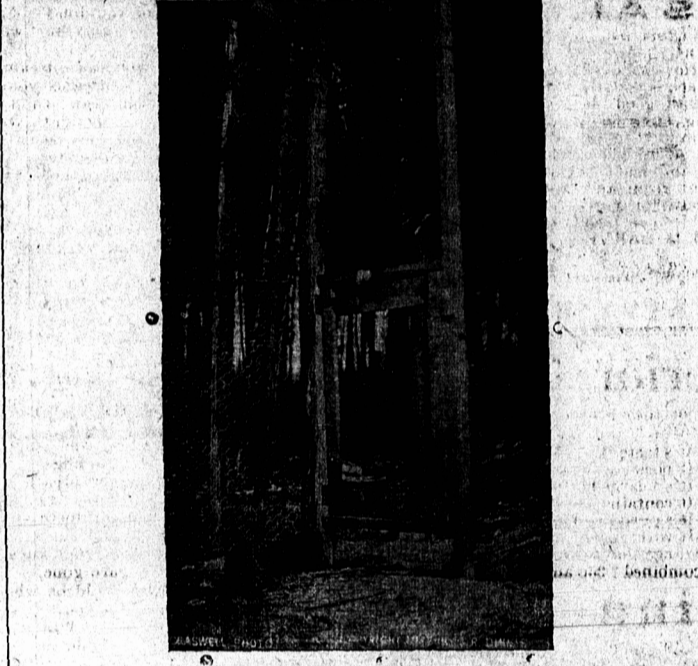


Inside View of the Company's Ranch, Freeland, P. E. Island.
