QUEBEC S. S. LINE.—The S. S. Casapedia of the Quebec S. S. Line, left Montreal Thursday for Charlottetown and is due here on Monday morning.

PRODUCE.—The schooner Manetta, Capt. Joseph Pope, sailed from Charlottetown for Louisbourg yesterday with a cargo of produce, loaded by Messrs. Carvell Bros., Charlottetown.

THE SWANSEA TRADER.—The S. S. Swansea Trader, of the Furness Line, arrived in Charlottetown yesterday from Halifax. She sailed again on return at noon with a good general cargo.

GREATEST EVER KNOWN.—The P. E. I. R. did the biggest passenger business in its history during the past four days, about 8,000 people having come to Charlottetown during the Exhibition. This is about 40 per cent more than has travelled on the P. E. I. R. in the same period of time, since its inauguration. Every passenger car was in use and in a few cases it was found necessary to put seats in box and flat cars to accommodate the enormous number of people travelling. The most of the Exhibition visitors travelling by train have returned home a great number leaving by the trains yesterday afternoon.

the feeble-minded, from propagating themselves. How could they tackle themselves? The school must do it, and society must see that the school did it.

THE SOLUTION First of all they must have the compulsory school law and then they must see that it was absolutely and rigidly enforced, so that the child would come in contact with every boy and girl in the community. After that contact, they must provide means for the mental and physical examinations of every boy and girl. Having found out who were the feeble-minded, who in all probability would become delinquents, they must provide means for their care. It had been found that not improve very much by education. The solution of how to deal with them was either to sterilize them, male and female, and so prevent propagation, or else place them in special institutions where they would be by themselves. Such institutions were even now in existence in Great Britain, the United States, France and Germany. Another institution that was necessary in the town and city was the juvenile court, but this fact he impressed, that the child that came before the juvenile court in most cases needed examination and treatment rather than punishment.

As they had not yet advanced sufficiently far to adopt sterilization, the solution of the question lay in their undertaking the institutional care of the delinquents and feeble-minded. It might be said that that would mean additional expense to the state. But a great deal of their present expense was due to the importance of the special care and treatment of the feeble-minded, if they put their feeble-minded and delinquents in institutions, it would mean economies in their police force, up-keep, penitentiary expenses, the cost of poor-houses, asylums, and so forth; and further, the feeble-minded institutions could be made practically self-supporting. If the States there was such an institution the inmates of which cultivated such a large farm that they produced sufficient not only for themselves but to have some for sale. He saw no reason why Prince Edward Island should not take upon itself to do that very thing. Its area was small, its population not very large, and its wealth great. In doing that they should remember that they would not only be treating the feeble-minded, but stopping the greatest source of crime and immorality. It would be the greatest benefit socially and commercially to the community.

SOME STATISTICS In the United States they had tackled the question with great vigor, and Professor Tait proceeded to quote a few facts which he said applied to them in Canada just as much as it did to the United States. He did not think that in Charlottetown they were different in this respect to any other place in the world. The test for feeble-mindedness had been exceptionally well brought out by Vinet, a noted French psychologist, and they had no longer to depend on the rule of thumb test of the physician. There were about 300,000 feeble-minded in the United States, and two per cent of the school children were feeble-minded. In England, seventy per cent of the habitual drunkards dealt with under the Inebriate Act were mentally defective. They would see that delinquency and feeble-mindedness were almost synonymous. The administration of justice in Canada last year cost over 32,000,000 dollars, or over \$4.50 per head of population. A large part of that was due entirely to the delinquent boy and girl. The chief causes of feeble-mindedness were three, being in order of importance, syphilis, alcoholism and tuberculosis. The question for them was: How were they to face the problem? The delinquent boy and girl were better off on the streets than in the school-room, where they would only corrupt the normal boy and girl by mixing with whom it simply meant the spreading of crime and immorality. It was entirely a matter of separation. To stamp out delinquency, to stamp out crime and feeble-mindedness, it was no use taking up the work in small societies in various places; but it must cover the whole country. The importance of the whole question was simply to prevent
