Adequate Use Of Maritime Ports Urged As Essential To National Development Of Canada. Ch'Town Trade Bd. Protest Fyled.

HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 11.—(By the Canadian Press)—The Maritime Transportation Commission and the Halifax Board of Trade joined forces today to assert the necessity of an east and west traffic policy in the development of Canada. Presenting a submission on behalf of the Maritime body before members of the Royal Commission on Transportation, R. K. Smith, K. C., M. P., declared that the east and west policy, written into the Acts of Union and repeatedly reiterated, had never been fully realized, with consequent inadequate use of Maritime Province ports.

Diversion of eastward moving submission declared that not only was full support for the policy necessary to the Dominion's greatest development, but that as in the particular case of grain, quoting from statements of Col. E. C. Phinney, chairman of the Halifax Harbor Commissioners, "detailed studies have convinced us that a rate can be made that will result in the use of the National Transcontinental Railway and at the same time be a profitable rate to the carriers."

Backing the position taken by the Maritime Board, "It is, we think, generally accepted," stated the brief presented on behalf of the Halifax Board of Trade by C. B. Smith, K. C., "that the national development of Canada is to a very large extent dependent on the establishment and maintenance, in an increasing degree, of east and west routes of traffic, and to attain this end, that it is necessary that the Atlantic seaboard ports be used to the greatest possible extent."

The activities of the past year were fully reviewed and plans were discussed for next season's tourist campaign.

SHORT MEETING OF COUNCIL

Annual Meeting of City Council Suggested On About Jan. 20th.

A short monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening with His Worship Mayor Prowse presiding.

The minutes of the meeting of December 28th and the adjourned meeting of December 14 were read and adopted.

The paid bills were read and payment confirmed and bills to be paid approved.

Dr. I. E. Croken's report was received and adopted. Dr. Croken stated that a milk vendor whose license had been cancelled because of repeated occurrence of sediment in the milk had received his license back; his milk was now being tested weekly and found clear.

Councillor Holman stressed the need for great care in the matter of sediment in milk.

His Worship stated the law with respect to this was being rigidly enforced.

The report of the Health Officers was presented and adopted.

Councillor Foster for the Finance Committee reported that the books would be closed on January 15 and suggested that the annual meeting be held about the 20th.

The police report was presented by Councillor Holman and adopted. Councillor Burke for the light committee reported he had received a letter from the Superintendent of the Canadian National Railway asking what the city intended doing with regard to street lighting in front of the Canadian National Hotel. Mr. Burke stated he had talked with Mr. McKee who told him that nothing could be done until the Spring.

A resolution that the tender of Irwin Printing Co. for printing the City report be accepted was passed, and the meeting adjourned.

U.M.W. PRES. REFUSES CUT

HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 11.—(By The Canadian Press)—A petition asking the Government of Nova Scotia to enlarge the reference to the Duncan Commission on coal mining to include investigation of wage reductions in the steel industry is likely to be unavailing.

"The terms of reference to the Duncan Commission were drawn up long before the steel workers suggested an enquiry into their wage schedule," said Hon. Gordon S. Harrington, Premier of Nova Scotia, this afternoon.

His intimation was that the commission, to be headed by Sir Andrew Rae Duncan, would proceed with its investigation as planned originally at a conference between representatives of the Government, the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation and the United Mine Workers. At this conference the corporation General Manager, H. J. Kelley, declared reduction of wages or reduction of the number of men employed was necessary to put the province's coal industry on a sound basis. D. W. Morrison, president of the U. M. W. District 26, was resolute in his refusing to accept wage reductions. So the Government offered to appoint a royal commission to investigate and make recommendations.

Missing Medico Is Located

MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 11. (By the Canadian Press)—Search for Dr. Z. W. Flynn, of Kentville, ended today when the missing doctor was located at a local hotel. Dr. Flynn said he had planned going to New Mexico to be at the bedside of his wife, who had been reported ill, but he now intended returning to Kentville tomorrow.

Dr. Flynn left Kentville last Monday after an attempt to bring him to Moncton by aeroplane failed owing to inability of the plane to make a landing due to lack of snow. His original intention had been to fly to Montreal, and next day was felt by friends who were unaware of his whereabouts.

PERLEY TO HEAD DELEGATION TO GENEVA

Ont. Premier Will Confer With Bennett

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 11.—Premier George S. Henry will visit Ottawa within the next few days to keep an appointment with Prime Minister R. B. Bennett made some time ago, it was learned last night from Mr. Henry.

It is understood that the appointment of a Lieutenant Governor for Ontario will be one of the major matters up for discussion.

Asked if the purpose of his visit to Ottawa was to confer with the Dominion authorities regarding further financial assistance to keep the northern Ontario road camps open until April 1, Premier Henry declared he purposed talking over many matters with Premier Bennett and that this matter was not to the forefront at present.

I have not seen Mr. Bennett for three months and there are many matters which I wish to talk over with him, said Premier Henry.

Man Already Sentenced To Hang In Connection With Crime.

SHERBROOKE, Que., Jan. 11.—Vezina Dube, of Hereford, Que., will face a charge of murder here tomorrow in connection with the slaying of Rene Malloy, of Norton Mills, Vermont. Malloy's body was found on Nov. 12, 1930, near the international border.

Albert St. Pierre has already been sentenced to hang on March 13 for the murder. It was announced here today that petitions requesting a reprieve for St. Pierre will be filed in the appeal court, at Montreal, next Friday. A third accused, Adelard Dube, brother of Vezina, will be tried on a murder charge later.

The death of Rene Malloy is closely linked with liquor smuggling into the United States. Malloy accompanied by his brother and a friend went to the Dube farm on the night of November 11, 1930, to get liquor, which, the survivors claim, had been purchased from St. Pierre. St. Pierre testified at his trial that the Vermont men were attempting to steal the liquor. When

Government Shows Sterner Hand In India

Nationalist Gatherings Outlawed Following Boycott Of British Goods And Attempt To Set Up "Parallel Government"

BOMBAY, India, Jan. 11.—The government today promulgated a special ordinance forbidding all meetings of groups containing more than five persons.

This latest measure automatically outlawed every gathering of the Nationalists who are conducting their campaign of civil disobedience and non-cooperation.

It came after the boycott against British goods, declared by Mahatma Gandhi and the All-India National Congress had succeeded in cutting business in Bombay to one-fourth its normal volume.

Governor Sir Frederick Sykes invited more than 100 prominent Bombay business men to discuss the situation with him. Declaring the sole purpose of the emergency ordinances was "to combat the unconstitutional, subversive and destructive civil disobedience move-
