By JACK HAND (Associated Press Sport Writer) NEW YORK, July 17 (AP)—War plans, farms and the services are returning to baseball such as the Yankees, Los Angeles of the Red Sox, Harland Clift of the Senators and Dick Wakefield of the Tigers who today hold the balance of power in the American League pennant chase.

As the majors enjoyed a fourth successive Monday open date before resuming interseasonal play tomorrow, the American League was still wide open with St. Louis, New York and Boston in the front row but none of the

others outdistanced. Luke Sewell's Browns, with only 22 more road dates, and a two-game lead held the advantage of finishing at home as the schedule sends all eastern teams into the west in the final two weeks of the season. The Browns and Yanks, who might be fighting it out, wind up the campaign in St. Louis, Oct. 1.

Although Cliff Leab and Mike Chartak rejoined the club, the Browns continued to bank on the lineup that kept them on top most of the season. Crosset, just released from a San Francisco shipyard, was expected to take his place with Harry Sauer, who as soon as he tells Joe McCarthy he's ready, but whether he'll replace Mike Milosevich as short or outfielder Herschel Martin had given the team a big lift since he was acquired from Milwaukee.

Boston's pitching troubles still held back the club despite its hitting power. Joe Egan picked up Red Barrett, a capable relief man from Columbus, but still leaned heavily on Tex Hughson.

\$2 per month in respect of the sixth and seventh and \$3 in respect of the eighth and additional child or children.

Officials said the allowances would have their greatest benefit for families in the low income groups, but the bill did not indicate what changes would be made in the income tax regulations to permit recovery of the allowances paid to families in the higher income groups.

Under the income tax act a reduction in tax payable was granted a taxpayer for child or children. When the allowances come into effect, the reduction granted for a child would be reduced to permit recovery of the allowances paid to families in the higher income groups.

This "appropriate amount" possibly would be announced at a later date by Finance Minister Bennett. In cases where the taxpayer's income ranged from \$6,000 upwards it was probable there would be little cash benefit from the allowances, it was learned. But in the smaller income groups the entire cash amount of the allowances would be received without affecting tax liability.

The bill revealed that the allowances would be paid to a "father, stepfather, mother, stepmother, foster father, mother, stepmother, adoptive mother, foster mother or any other person who has the custody of a child." The allowances would not be made to operators of institutions. The allowances must be applied by the person receiving the same exclusively towards the maintenance, care, training education and ad-

## Air Passenger Service To New Glasgow Opens

Air passenger service between this city and New Glasgow, N.S., began yesterday afternoon when Capt. Carl Burke, manager of the Maritime Central Airways took off from the Charlottetown airport at 1:10 p.m. New Glasgow is only 95 to 100 minutes away by air and indications are that the service will be a popular one.

On a special round flight between the regular passenger trips Burke brought New Glasgow's mayor, D. R. MacLeod and three newsmen to Charlottetown.

The two newsmen from Charlottetown were Mayor J. E. Blain and driven into Charlottetown where he remained about an hour before returning to the airport at 4 o'clock to catch the plane back to New Glasgow. Mayor MacLeod presented Mayor Blain with an address in which he referred to his pleasure in seeing the two cities linked up by air and recalling the long time that the two places occupied the best part of a day, and during the winter even a longer time.

Passengers on the outward flight from Charlottetown yesterday included a ten-month-old baby accompanied by its parents, Capt. Gordon (West) Storey and Mrs. Storey. Capt. Storey was en route to New Glasgow to represent the regular passenger service.

Mr. Storey, a member of the Legislative Assembly for Montserrat for the last five years, was quoted as adding: "I am in this county, and you will see that young men are as numerous everywhere as the war.
