—Rev. Frederic S. Bamford, who

church, and it is understood will ac-
cept. He will farrow from Lewis-
ville church the last Sunday in Sep-

the West is so very objectionable in
comparison with the East that few
Provincial teachers would be content
there. Here in Prince Edward
Island teachers are in very many
cases paid salaries, all for the en-
tire year's services, which are good,
considering the low cost of living,
and the fact that they are allowed
two months or more holidays gratis.

WASTE OF LIFE.
The annual economic waste in the
city of New York from preventable
disease is estimated at \$40,000,000.
The estimate is based on the record
of sickness and death from preventa-
ble diseases for a period of four
years, loss in dollars being figured
on the actuarial computation of the
prospect of life and earnings fur-
nished by state and insurance statis-
ticians. Contingent losses of suffer-
ing in families are not figured into
this estimate. Money spent in pre-
ventive effort, providing pure air and
clear light and healthful surround-
ings for tenement dwellers, it
the best conservation policy that the
cities of the country can enter into.
It is worth dollars to save the trees,
and it is worth more dollars to save
men, women and children.— Boston
Herald.

OBITUARY.
The death at the early age of twen-
ty-nine years of Ida Edith Mc-
Gregor, beloved wife of George M.

The demise of Mrs. Campbell, who
was loved and respected both in her
native and adopted community, has
caused an irreparable loss in the
home, but those who are left behind
are consoled by the evidence which
she has left, that she has passed
away trusting in the finished work
of Christ.
