GERMAN PROGRESS HAS BEEN STOPPED

LONDON, Aug. 30.—Exchange from Paris (official) says the progress of the German wing has forced us to give ground.

LONDON, Aug. 31.—The Telegraph correspondent at Amiens, on appointment by the Minister of War, Miller, and who went to the front conferred with General Joffre. His latest news is this: German outposts have advanced southward slightly. They are being held back successfully by British troops and by the left French wing. The raid of Uhlans appears to have been stopped.

It seems certain that the German forces, temporarily spent by their own tactics, must have at least for the time being been worn down by sending large masses of infantry forward to face the artillery fire. They sacrificed an enormous number. It is doubtful whether they are able to bring up men fast enough to fill the gaps and especially whether they can replenish their ammunition fast enough. German losses certainly have been heavier than the French. We heard, for instance, of German dead on the front of four miles. Undoubtedly German casualties have been large bodies of men to destruction. The 112th German Infantry regiment lost all but seventy men in one charge at Charleroi.

LONDON, Aug. 31.—The Times Special from Chalons, France—Refugees from Port-sur-Laine, near the frontier, say their village was burned by the Germans and the Kaisers finest Prussian troops were unable to shatter it. The enemy is in retreat and constantly attacked.

LONDON, Aug. 31.—Telegraph Special from Chalons, France—Refugees from Port-sur-Laine, near the frontier, say their village was burned by the Germans last Wednesday, after a bombardment of six days. No able bodied men were in the village, all being in the French army. The bombardment finally drove the inhabitants, women and children, into cellars provided by the authorities. Chamberle, the only person in authority in the commune, German soldiers finally saturated mattresses with oil, lighted them and threw them into cellars to smoke out the inhabitants, last of whom they fled. A few of the fleeing ones were shot by the soldiers who also detained two nuns who have not since been heard from.

LONDON, Aug. 31.—Exchange Special from Port-sur-Laine, in Southwest Africa, gravely wounded by the natives whom they determined to disarm. They have been hitherto loyal to the Germans. A German missionary was instructed to summon a tribal gathering, and Hottentots flock-

ed from the surrounding country. They brought along their rifles which they stacked prior to the meeting. While the missionary gave an eloquent address the German soldiers confiscated the rifles. The tribes furiously resented the trickery.

HOLD CLERGY PRISONERS

LONDON, Aug. 31.—The Berlin Tageblatt, in its war news from Liege, says German authorities have made Cardinal Janssen and fifteen priests, prisoners, as hostages for the good behavior of the populace. Placards on walls of the town state that these hostages will be shot immediately if another shot is fired by the inhabitants on the German troops.

THE LOSSES

LONDON, Aug. 31.—There emerges from the details given a clear impression of the tremendous effort put forth by the German community to strike an annihilating blow.

The losses, up to Wednesday night, are estimated by Sir John French at 6,000 men. These have been paid for by the Germans by a far heavier price. The Russian armies in East Prussia are approaching the fortresses of Thorn and Drauzenz. Garrisons of these fortresses are joining in resistance to the Russian. The Russian advance in Galicia is still proceeding. On the other hand Austrian forces have invaded Russian Poland and are advancing towards Lutsk. As one military correspondent points out, this Austrian offensive will have to be disposed of before the Russian invasion of East Prussia and Galicia can be pressed home. The French Government has called up all classes of Reservists not already in the field: The report that Bologna has been occupied by German troops is contradicted. A German aeroplane flew over Paris Sunday and dropped three bombs without doing any appreciable damage. Vice Admiral Kato, Commander-in-Chief of the second Japanese squadron, proclaims a blockade of the coast line in the neighborhood of Tsing-Tau and Port of Kalu Chau.

LORD METHUEN'S PREDICTION

LONDON, Aug. 31.—Field Marshal Methuen speaking at Devises last night declared the Kaiser would find that Germany would get her wings clipped. It might be a long and terrible struggle, but the allies would win in the end. Any eligible man who refused to come forward when the country needed him was nothing but a coward.

P. E. I. SLAND SENDS ANOTHER CONTINGENT

Another detachment of the P. E. Island Heavy Brigade Artillery, who arrived from Canis and Sydney on Friday evening, left Monday morning for Val Cartier en route for the front. A very large crowd of citizens turned out to farewell the boys, and they did with right good will, assisted by the splendid band of the 4th Regiment Band. The company comprising Sgt-Major George Brady, Corporal S. Elliott, Winsloe; Bombardier, Richard Bur-

hoe, 3 Elm Ave., Charlottetown; Gunners John Strain, William McInnis, J. Stewart, John Bowden and W. Higgins, all of Charlottetown and Stephen McKinnon, King Street; J. Coody, Sydney Street and K. McLean, Douglas Street, marched to the railway station headed by the band and amid handshaking and good wishes boarded their train. As it was pulling out three rousing cheers were given for the boys and the band played God Save the King.

AMERICAN EXPERT FORESEES PARIS BESIEGED, WITH THE ALLIES MOVING ON BERLIN

French Capital Wouldn't be in Danger, and with Russians Coming in Rear and Allies in Front, the Entire German Forces in Fatherland would be Crushed Utterly, Thus Relieving Siege of Paris, He Thinks.

NEW YORK, August 31.—The deepest mystery of war veils the operation along the Belgian border. British reports that her contingent has had to withdraw slightly before greatly superior numbers, but conditions are satisfactory; the French report that Belgian events have not interfered with arrangements for future developments along the Lorraine border; while the Germans declare they have surrounded the Allies in the north and have isolated positions about Namur. It is probable that Germany has been able to throw such overwhelming forces against the Franco-Belgian frontier as to compel the Allies to fight a series of retreating actions. The German advance around Lille appears to have been carried out, after all, but subordinate to the main movement through the Namur district.

Allies is unbelievable unless some disastrous errors have been committed. The French and English are fighting with their rear protected by the La-Fere-Loan-Rheims line of fortifications. The report of so stupendous an enterprise as cutting off the Allies from this long line of retreat must be accepted with reserve. It is possible, however, that the Germans occupy three sides of the surrounded square. They are back of the Allies away from Belgium from the north; their move around Lille, if conducted in sufficient force, would block the Allies in on the west, while the advance from Luxemburg through the gap from captured Longwy to Stenay, forms an eastern wall against the allied armies. As nearly as we can judge, therefore, the French and English driven out of three sides by German armies and on the fourth side by the line of strong fortifications, La-Fere-Loan-Rheims about 75 miles from Paris. If this supposition is true, and it is based primarily on German reports, it would seem that Paris is certain to be invested before long. Such may be the meaning of the French official report that "the events in the region of the future developments in the region between the Vosges and Nancy."

Masterful Strategy Possible The possibility hidden in this curious statement is that the Germans are soon to arrive before Paris, and when they do, the French field army will reform and try again the offensive movement in Lorraine between Metz and Strassburg that recently ended so abruptly. The crucial phase of the war, therefore, may soon take this triple aspect;
