MORWENNA.—The S. S. Morwenna arrived here from Montreal at one o'clock yesterday morning with a large general cargo and 33 passengers. She sailed at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon for St. John's, Newfoundland, via Sydney, C. B. Her outward cargo consisted of 500 bags oats, 228 bales hay, 300 bags potatoes, 150 barrels potatoes, 75 barrels cabbage, 200 bags turnips, 90 boxes vegetables, 3 horses, 21 head cattle, 21 sheep and sundry other cargo. Mr. T. J. Morris, formerly of this city, was a passenger to Sydney, C. B.

SPECIAL MEETINGS.—The meetings being held in Christian Church, Bradabane, and which are being conducted by Evangelist Lowell C. McPherson are attended by congregations which fill the church. SEPTEMBER CROP REPORT

THE WEATHER.—The crop report of July 25th, gave the weather conditions up to that time. Slight showers of rain fell on August 2nd, 7th, 11th, 20th, and 27th. Heavy shower with thunder on August 28th, and an exceptionally heavy shower on August 30th. The total precipitation for the month of July was 4.18 inches, and for the month of August 2.55 and for September up to the 9th, 1.23. The above refers to Charlottetown and vicinity only. Both months were moderately warm with no excessive heat, the mean temperature for July being 64.5, for August 64.6 and for September to 7th, 60. On the nights of the 5th and 6th, there was local frost, particularly in King's County, which affected severely potatoes and corn.

HAY.—The hay crop turned out much better than was expected, the rains during the latter part of July causing unusual growth. It was saved in excellent condition and should provide a lot of good feed, although somewhat lacking in clover. Hay-making was completed about the middle of August. The usual amount of timothy seed has not been saved.

GRAIN.—The first grain was cut on August 18th, but harvest was not general till a fortnight later. At the time of writing about half the crop is in stock and a small proportion has been saved.

WHEAT.—The wheat crop is much above the average. It is well filled, and the straw is clear and bright. A few correspondents report injury from joint worm. Smut, too, has taken more than the usual toll.

OATS.—The oat crop is good, but will not come up to July expectations. That sown very early is thin, short and uneven. The same is true of what was sown on the lower lying lands. Smut has caused a heavy loss where the grain was not treated. A few correspondents report the grain not filling well, but the great majority report an excellent crop, much above the average, although not as heavy as last year, well filled and free from rust and blight. There is every prospect of good weather for saving it.

BARLEY.—There is not much change to report in the barley crop since July 25th. It shows a little improvement and the grain is filling well.

CORN.—Corn has been more or less of a failure. The season has been too cold for it and it is not likely to mature sufficiently to make good feed. In some places it has already

POTATOES.

The potato crop has made excellent growth since last report. There have been no bugs and the blight has not done any damage yet. It is not likely the crop will be equal to that of last year, on account of the bad germination, but if good weather continues it will be much above the average.

ROOTS.

The root crop is somewhat patchy. Some correspondents report the crop excellent, others very poor. Club root seems to be spreading and is doing a lot of damage. On the whole the crop will be above average.

FRUIT.

Apples of all kinds will be scarce and of inferior quality. They are small for the time of the year and lack color. Where the spraying was not done thoroughly, the scab is bad. Plums will be a fair crop.

PASTURES.

The pastures were good during July and August, some report them getting bare now. After growth is good. Fall feed will be plentiful and the prospects for winter feed are reported good. This report is general for the three counties.

DAIRY.

The pastures being good the milk supply is much better than last year. The make in the early part of the season being short, the amount made for the whole season will not be much in excess of last year.

EGGS.

There is a large increase in the egg production over last year, averaging about 20 per cent. Where egg circles have been formed, the increase is marked.

GERMANY'S NEW ISLAND IN THE NORTH SEA.

LONDON, Sept. 8.—Germany has created a new island in the North Sea. It lies off the lower part of Heligoland and is half as big as that island. The materials for creating the new island are being sent from Germany. Heligoland is very seldom visited, as it is devoted entirely to military works and every arrival is watched with suspicion. The new island shelters small cruisers, destroyers, submarines and torpedo boats. It has become a huge

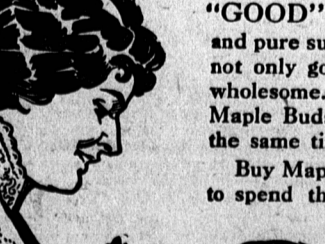
naval fortress, with huge Krupp guns, which command all the approaches from the sea.
