supply the farmers without cash and handle the hay for nothing, let them go to it." Wat was the result. All orders were cancelled and the matter was left completely in the government's hands. And what was the result of this? For a long time there was no hay. The farmers' cattle were starving in their barns. Mr. Carter in Charlottetown had a few cars coming in and the government got hold of this and sold it at a higher price than the merchants were charging. All along the line, and higher than the Commissioner could have bought it from his friends in Prince County.

**HON. MR. LEA:** How high was that?

**MR. KENNEDY:** I am told it was sold for \$25 and \$24.

**HON. MR. LEA:** Nonsense!

**MR. KENNEDY:** Well, I saw a car load of your hay at Fredericton that was sold at \$24. And a very poor quality of hay it was, and if the farmers there could have got anybody else to get hay for them they would have left the car on the track, which is exactly what they did at other stations.

**HON. MR. LEA:** What station?

**MR. KENNEDY:** Mr. Hunter River, for one.

**HON. MR. LEA:** I never heard of it.

**MR. KENNEDY:** This happened a week ago. These things must go through your hands very easily. The hon. Commissioner seems to know so much and talks so loud, but whenever anybody talks him up he crawls into his hole.

**HON. MR. LEA:** You know an amount.

**MR. KENNEDY:** declared that he certainly knew something about this matter. At times one might be tempted to say that the Department was becoming a proper nuisance to the country. The purchase of hay through this parliament has cost the country about \$35,000 and if it had done one bit of good he would like to see it. The hon. Commissioner had referred to the seed shortage and had talked of the wonderful things he was doing in buying oats of such prices. But it is set to be done on other things the country can buy oats or anything else any cheaper than the regular trade. The quotation sent out to a farmer in Mr. Kennedy's district two weeks ago was given by the department on a car of seed oats, delivered at 78 cents a bushel, sent with the quotation and the receiver brought this sample to Mr. Kennedy's store where it was inspected. He would compare it with his own No. 2 quality, delivered, according to the regular trade conditions, if it is the intention of the hon. Commissioner of Agriculture to give the farmers everything at cost, how does this difference in price come in?

It is true that there was a great shortage of feed this year and farmers have been forced to import a great deal. Circulars were sent out by the Department of Agriculture advocating the use of corn and other substitutes and they offered corn at a price which the merchants of the country met with a nice margin of profit. But in Charlottetown a different condition existed. A farmer needing some of this corn would walk into the Commissioner's office for twenty or thirty bushels. "Got the money?" "Yes." Then the Commissioner would send him down to a great friend of the Government—Mr. Geo. E. Bull—where he would be given seed at \$2.30 a cwt., which is sold in the country—and no doubt in Charlottetown elsewhere—at \$1.90 and often at \$1.80. Of course, coming through the Department of Agriculture, the farmer would think he was getting a reduction of fertilizer. But this last reduction was secured two years ago by the Conservatives and it has not been changed one iota since.

**HON. MR. LEA:** Nonsense. I can show you where you are wrong.

**HON. MR. LEA:** We secured a reduction of fertilizer. According to the regulations of the railroad, if a car contained any part of nitrate of soda the whole car was classed at a higher rate. We were enabled to get a reduction through reclassification so that if a car does not have certain 25 per cent. of nitrate of soda it goes at a lower rate. We got this ap-
