

# The Proposed New Catholic Hospital

**CIRCULAR FROM THE BISHOP**  
A circular from Bishop O'Leary was read in the various churches of the diocese yesterday in connection with the proposed erection of a new Catholic Hospital. The circular read in part as follows:—

Divine Providence has seen fit to try the Diocese of Charlottetown very severely in the disastrous fire which occurred in the City Hospital on Tuesday, Nov. 22nd. The building, which heretofore has served efficiently as a hospital, has been so badly destroyed, that it is the unanimous verdict of the Medical Staff that it can be used no longer, even when repaired, as a permanent hospital. It has, therefore, been decided to vote the present Hospital Building to a Home for the Poor and aged and to build a new modern and up-to-date Hospital.

The necessity of such work is evident to all who consider, for a moment, the wonderful amount of good that the Hospital has done in the Diocese since its inception. For many years it alone supplied the needs of the entire Province, independent of class or creed, and even to the present it gives of its best to the patients from every part of the Island and of the Maritimes.

It would simply be a calamity should the work so efficiently carried on in the past and so productive of good in saving life and in curing the sick, have to be abandoned, or even be so utterly handicapped as it would be in the present building repaired. In fact it is something that no person in the Diocese would think of. The only alternative, however is the erection of a new Hospital and this decision, we have been forced to take in the circumstances.

On the other hand the crying need for a home for the poor and aged has called forth longing desires on the part of many of the Clergy and of the people. We have no such place. The charity of the Diocese, so great in caring for the sick and orphan, has not extended itself to the poor and aged, who, nevertheless, by their desolation and poverty, appeal sympathetically to all christian hearts. The Provincial Home is found absolutely incapable of meeting this need and it seems that the spirit of christian charity impels us to give of what God has given to us, that we may help to shelter His homeless ones. Those, who in God's mercy have their comfortable homes and happy firesides, should thank God for what He has given them. But let us also remember these who are not so blessed, and should reflect that the day may come for them also, as it has come for others as well to do as they are now when they will search for a place of comfort to lay their old and weary limbs. A home for the aged, therefore, is a necessity as well as a new Hospital.

It is proposed to meet both these needs at once by repairing the old Hospital which is to be converted into a Home and building a new Hospital to serve the needs of the sick and the dying. The repairs to the old Hospital can be made with the insurance, so that the Home will be provided without calling on the Diocese, but the means to erect the New Hospital must be gathered from the Diocese in general. Hence it has been decided to put on a Drive for One Hundred Thousand Dollars payable in installments. The Drive is to commence in Charlottetown on Monday, Dec. 5th, and to continue until the night of Saturday, Dec. 17th, and in the Parishes it will commence on Monday, Dec. 12th, and continue until the night of Saturday, Dec. 24th. The objective set for the City is \$17,000.00, and the objective of the different parishes will be forwarded to each Pastor within a very few days.

Many are praying that the coming year may be a prosperous one, but their prayers will be much more acceptable in the sight of the Most High, if accompanied by the

**HALIFAX THEATRE OF WAR IS DECISION**  
At last it is practically assured that Halifax fortress and the outposts embraced in the district, will be recognized officially as having been a theatre of actual war, and during 1914-1918 will receive their just and deserved rewards, including Imperial medals and decorations.

Why these facts, which were known last Tuesday evening following have been kept from public knowledge, is a mystery. The news, however, leaked out that a delegation of the Army and Navy Veterans in Canada, Halifax unit and prominent officers of the militia, met with Hector McLeary, R. C. at a special meeting called by Captain J. D. Monaghan, president of the Halifax unit, Army and Navy Veterans, and that there had been something more substantial than mere eloquent promises that Halifax fortress would be commemorated by Governor-General's order-in-Council as in the theatre of war and the officers and men who served in the fortress would fully come into their own.

The officers and men, who at the opening of the war, were the first ordered out, were members of the following militia units: 1st C. G. A. 64th Regiment "Halifax Rifles," 66th "Princess Louise Fusiliers," 94th "Cape Breton Highlanders," and P. E. I. Heavy Battery, Composite Battalion, Canadian Engineers, Army Services Corps and Army Medical Corps.

**NATIONALIST LEADER IN INDIA ARRESTED**  
LAHORE BRITISH, India, Dec. 5.—Dala Lajpat Rai, Nationalist leader, who in August presided over meeting which passed resolutions not to welcome the Prince of Wales on his visit to India was arrested here today while conducting a political meeting at Santambam. A barrister and two other "non-co operators" were arrested with him. All the men were charged with contravening the sedition meeting act.
