Outlook Hopeful For Canada

MONTREAL, Oct. 19 — "Those prophets of gloom who predict a business recession should see their Canada at first hand," said N. B. Walton C.B.E., executive vice president, Canadian National Railways, on his return from a three week inspection of the company's western facilities. "If the real cure for inflation is production, then Canada is doing all right in this post-war world. I have never seen our country working so hard at peacetime production."

"Nature has been especially bountiful this year. There is an excellent grain crop and much of it is already on the way to markets. The Okanagan Valley has a near record fruit crop which is being picked and shipped rapidly. Good crops mean prosperity for eastern as well as western Canada. I see no reason for pessimism," he concluded.

With Mr. Walton on his recent trip were four members of the railway board of directors; R. B. Brennan, Saint John; J. A. Northey, Toronto; B. L. Daly, Montreal; and E. J. Young, Dunsmuir, Sask. In the west they were accompanied by W. R. Devenish, vice president, western region.

They travelled some 5,000 miles, covering the prairies way from the populated centres to get an ideal cross-section. The inspection included such diverse activities as handling iron ore at the lakehead to shipbuilding at Victoria, B. C.

PLAN NEW FACTORIES WREXHAM, Wales, Oct. 18 — (CP) New factories built to meet war needs have brought a promise of future prosperity to Wrexham where unemployment reached 25 per cent in the late 30s.

Seven thousand extra jobs will be provided by the Board of Trade. Many of them will be for women who had little chance to work in the district's heavy industries before 1939.

A big royal ordnance factory near Macclesfield, where 10,000 were employed on munitions contracts, is being leased in sections to manufacturers. One company alone plans to hire 4,000 persons. A surgical supply firm will need 800 others.

Other wartime factories will be used by manufacturers of steel office equipment, light chemicals, underwear and leather goods.

Between the wars, Wrexham area suffered from a decline in its basic industries: coal mining, steel-making, bricks and tile plants and some agriculture. The steel position is improved; and while the other activities still are curtailed there will be enough new secondary industries to take up the employment slack.

Wrexham has been proclaimed a "Development Area" under the government plan for eliminating pockets of unemployment, but the Board of Trade reports "it is considered unlikely that it will be necessary to attract further additional industries into the area."

FOOD PRICES RISE STEADILY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 — (AP)—Before the decontrol of meat, food prices in the United States averaged 21.4 per cent higher than on June 30, the bureau of labor statistics reported tonight.

The food price average rose 1.8 per cent during the week ended Oct. 12, making an advance of 7.5 per cent for the four weeks up to then.

Climbing prices for farm products boosted the wholesale price index as a whole to 126 per cent of the 1926 average in the week ended Oct. 12.

Rapid Expansion of Credit Unions

A report recently issued by the Economic Division, Marketing Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture, on "Credit Unions in Canada in 1946" discloses the importance to which these co-operative credit societies have reached in the realm of Canadian business.

At the end of 1946 there were 2,219 credit unions in Canada, 168 more than in 1944 and 1,052 more than in 1940. Total membership in the unions was 590,764 and the assets amounting to \$145,800,000 compared with \$25,089,686 in 1940. J. O. McEneaney, author of the report points out that with the increase in membership and assets in the year under review, the business increased steadily also despite the scarcity of durable consumer goods and the generally high level of income. This Mr. O'Meara says, is in contrast to experience in the United States.

Loans to members of Federal Credit Unions had fallen off and that assets and other than loans to members made up 76 per cent of the total in 1944.

There are credit unions in every province. In Quebec there are 908; in Ontario, 266; in Nova Scotia, 218; in Alberta, 172; in Saskatchewan, 172; in New Brunswick, 145; in British Columbia, 145; in Manitoba, 100 and in Prince Edward Island, 52.

Nearly all credit unions in Canada are united or joined at the provincial level of federations or leagues for the purpose of effecting savings by co-operative purchase of supplies and in many cases to provide legal, accounting and educational services. In each province there is a central credit society which receives surplus funds of individual unions and makes them available to other unions and co-operative associations.

An interesting development of Canadian Credit Unions has been the provision of group medical care and hospitalization for members.

The greater percentage of the members of the unions live in rural districts, and earn their living by farming.

KILLED IN SELF DEFENCE

WINNIPEG, Oct. 18 — (CP) — Claude Frederick Salisbury met his death accidentally when he attempted to choke his common-law wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Maud McLean, defence counsel S. Hart Green told the jury at Mrs. McLean's trial here today.

Addressing the jury for 45 minutes, Mr. Green claimed that Salisbury picked up a knife in self-defence against an attack by Salisbury, whom witnesses had testified was in the habit of using filthy language to Mrs. McLean.

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New Zealand Has Extensive Plans For Servicemen

AUCKLAND, N.Z. Oct. 18 — (CP)—With the return of the last portion of New Zealand's original occupation force from Japan the Dominion has completed repatriation of all large bodies of troops who were serving overseas on V.J. Day.

Out of a population of 632,000 when war started, the Dominion had 300,000 men of military age. A total of 235,000 (including a few thousand women) joined the forces during the war, while there were peak totals of 124,000 in the home guard and 150,000 in the Emergency Provisions Service. The maximum mobilizations in the services was 107,000 in September 1942, the respective totals being 127,000 in the army, 6,000 in the navy and 24,000 in the air force.

A total of 125,000 men and women saw service overseas, and of these 10,130 were killed, 19,246 wounded 8,086 taken prisoner and 994 are still classed as missing. On V.J. Day New Zealand had a large base establishment in Italy and Egypt, large numbers of air force personnel in Europe and several squadrons in island bases in the Pacific, and several personnel in most parts of the world.

There are still small groups in England, Europe and the Pacific.

With the return of the last group from Japan the rehabilitation department is operating at what will probably be its peak activity. New Zealand laid the foundations of its post-war care of troops in October 1941. The Rehabilitation Act was passed under which rehabilitation officers and committees were set up in every town of any size in the country, with power to grant loans.

Trade training courses were established in the main towns where ex-servicemen could learn carpentry, bricklaying, plastering and other skilled trades. Those who elected to train under private employers had their wages subsidised by the government while they were earning less than standard rates. Grants were authorized to the Disabled Soldiers' Rehabilitation League which took charge of vocational training for men suffering from war disabilities.

The Housing Problem

To help meet the housing situation, the most acute problem for many ex-servicemen, the government laid down that half of all state houses built should be allocated to war veterans.

One of the major activities undertaken was the settling of veterans on the land. The rehabilitation department investigated all properties for which ex-servicemen sought loans. Only where there was reasonable prospect of the veteran making a living were loans granted, but where the property was approved grant were authorized up to \$16,000 for most farms and up to \$20,000 for sheep farms.

About 300,000 acres of land was also acquired by the government, subdivided and developed and made available for veterans under various types of tenure.

In addition to loans of various kinds other types of assistance ap-

proved included disability pensions, concessions under apprenticeship regulations, concessions in the passing of university and other examinations, and war gratuities at the rate of \$10.40 a month for service overseas and \$3.20 a month for service within New Zealand.

So far loans totalling about \$77,000,000 have been made and the total amount authorized for all rehabilitation purposes is about \$130,000,000. This does not include gratuity payments, which it is estimated will total \$57,000,000 when all claims have been met.
