THIRD RACE FOR COMMODORE'S CUP

Won by Minagoo Saturday Afternoon—P. No. Second and Zenith Third.

Out-manoeuvring the rest of the fleet over the last leg of the course Jack Pineau, owner and skipper of the Minagoo piloted his craft from third position to cross the line a good winner in the third race of the Commodore's cup series held Saturday afternoon.

It was a great race from a spectator's viewpoint, interesting, so much so that up until five minutes of the finish it was a difficult proposition to pick not only the winning boat, but the ones fighting for second and third position.

This race was one of the best sailed this year. A strong southwest wind prevailing practically throughout gave the eighteen footers all they could handle. A flat calm however on the last leg slowed the race to such an extent that the leaders merely drifted over the finish line.

Not forgetting the Minagoo's splendid showing, it may be mentioned that freshish wind and a strong out-going tide played havoc in the lead and looking like a winner with P. No. right on her stern. A drifting match developed between the two, Jack Pineau quickly realizing the situation carried on out of the tide to tack to the stake boat four minutes ahead of P. No. in second place; the Zenith sailing over only seconds behind.

The Minagoo now leads in total number of points scored so far in the series, with P. No. second, Zenith third and Sheba fourth. A number of other races are to be staged in this series before a winner will be declared.

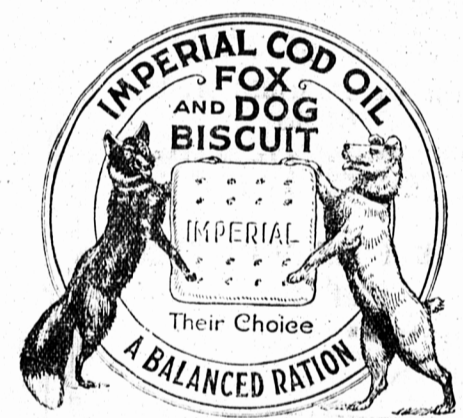
