NEGLECTING A CHANCE IN EXPORT TRADE?

In securing trade orders under Canadian credits abroad, the Canadian Trade Commission reports that certain industries have taken a predominant place, and that other classes equally important have done little to obtain an allocation. As the main idea in establishing credits was to enable Dominion industries as a whole to "carry on" over a difficult period and to enable a larger entry to be made into the export field, the attention of business men in all industries is called to the conditions. It is thought advisable to spread the credits over unused factory capacity without confining the benefits to a few lines, and thus prevent unemployment where possible. Present conditions offer to golden opportunities of entering the permanent export

markets which may not again recur, and the Commission impresses on traders which may never have exported before the striking advantages of group endeavor.

Woolen and garment-making firms, it is learned, are not planning to take orders which may interfere with the domestic orders expected in a few months though in some cases garment factories are only running 25 per cent. of capacity. The average running capacity of all industries in Canada at present is probably 70 to 75 per cent. Trades already organized into groups are manufacturers of paint and varnish, agricultural implements, hardware, boots and shoes, woollens and clothing.



Presentation to Mr. And Mrs. L. L. Jenkins

A CHAPLAIN'S SURROUNDINGS

It was in a hotel rotunda he was speaking, a rather superior class of hotel. Also it was run now for a purpose never intended in its history, and, therefore not such an incongruous event as it seemed.

Before an audience not one of whom was disinterested he stood, his fair hair framed against a strange scene painted on the wall, his voice low but confident, his manner full of that appeal which comes to the padre who has done his duty with the fighting troops. He knew his audience as he knew his subject. There was no tinge of impromptu-ness such as ruins the effectiveness of so many of the men who talk to the soldiers. Though it was not a large crowd, it was evident that he considered it important enough to prepare his address.

Back of him was a small stage, which a very secular orchestra had vacated for this other form of entertainment. And back of the stage was a painting on the wall that gave the touch of incongruity that might have

spoiled a less serious affair.

It was in Paris, and the picture depicted the gayest of Paris a fete scene by night, with a sparsely garbed dance on a platform and an exaggerated clown in the foreground. And all about was the frivolous light of Chinese lanterns and the frivol of a Paris crowd out to enjoy itself—and the fireworks cutting into the darkness of the picture's background.

Out in the office, just there within view, soldiers came and went, registering for rooms their heavy packs bending them low at this evening hour. The French officer passed from office to bureau and back, a hush on his step as there was in the movement through the halls.

Three Australians entered the swing doors opening to the street and

stood watching and listening. There was awkwardness in their attitude, but they stayed; and in a moment their hats came off. A couple of Canadians joined them in silence. The halls and office filled quietly with a listening crowd—even a French officer and two pollus among them.

What they heard was a friendly chat on the 23rd Psalm—an old bit of Scripture, but it held them to the last. And the fair haired padre talked on. And the semi-nude dancing girl kicked her heels behind his head. And the soldiers sang with a vim that put to shame the songs of others gatherings. The Canadian Y. M. C. A. Hotel d'Iena, in Paris, was filling a large place in the lives of the Canadians on leave.
