She was seventy-two years of age and was a daughter of the late Hon. Peter McNutt of Malpeque. She leaves to mourn two sons Louis, the Postmaster, Summerside, and William P. Manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia at Montreal; also, four daughters: Mrs. J. B. Hegan and Misses Florence, Margaret and Ethel at home. The Hon. Peter McNutt, Malpeque, is a brother of the deceased. The funeral will take place Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock from her late residence, Granville street to St. John's Church cemetery at St. Leonards.

—The death occurred yesterday morning of George Hinton, one of Summerside's oldest and most respected residents, after an illness of several months. Deceased was a native of Bathurst, N. B., and was eighty-two years of age. He came to this Province about 56 years ago, locating in Summerside where he successfully conducted a canning business up to about fifteen years ago. When he retired his son Thomas took charge of the business. He was married in 1853 to Elizabeth Dawson of Tryon, who predeceased him about nine months. He leaves to mourn three sons: J. S. and Thomas of Summerside and George of Fort William, Ont. The funeral takes place this afternoon at 2.30 from his late residence to the Methodist Church, where the funeral services will take place. The burial takes place at the Peoples' Cemetery.
