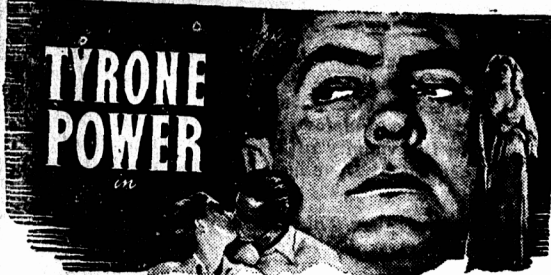

bits as well. We came upon road crews at work, the big machines appearing to be pieces of art on this trail. In the glens, streams descended from the higher levels to the valleys flocks of sheep pastured, often in numbers and one heard the tinkle of cow bells echoing musically on the quiet air. James commented on the number of white ones he had seen since arriving.

Leaving Cape Smoky behind us—"A massive headland towering 1000 feet above the sea and often split halfway up, by a fleecy cloud bank which gives it the name of the headland its name at Briton Cove. In a cabin situated high on a hill. Even by night it is exceedingly beautiful here, the moonlight picking out the dim outlines of the mountains about as well as the sea in the distance. The sound of it is borne to us here on a light breeze, which mourns about the caves in a manner which our husbands say might mean rain. A light on Deer Island flashes brightly and beyond another which points the entrance to Sydney Harbour. Lights also twinkle from farm-houses in the neighborhood and from the verandah where we are enjoying the coolness after a hot day, we can make out the chimneys of a house directly below this elevation in a valley here. A car leaves a canteen a few yards away on the roadway and young voices rise happily in good-nights before it cuts a swath of light and disappears around a bend. And a quiet again except for the low conversation about me and the roll of the Atlantic and those at Alderlea and many a one on The Island that is home comes to mind, and we send them winging a way to loved ones there—that all may be well with them as it is with us on this other Island, this night before the Sabbath.

"Beautiful thoughts are those that bear, On the wings of love a silent prayer, Over the mountains or over the sea. That His peace may ever abide with thee, Abide with thee when the shadows fall. When the day is done and the night birds call. When morning comes and the shadows flee. I know He still will abide with thee." Until Monday — Diary — Good-night.
