PLUMBING - The plumbing, heating and wiring contract for the dehydrator plant being built at Summerside has been awarded to R. T. McKeown and Co. of this city. The work on the building will be under contract to M. F. Seaman and Co. Ltd. of Summerside. It is expected that the dehydrator will be finished in about a week and covered with slate shingles. The brick chimney will be completed in three or four days. The bricklayers are working inside a framework which is being built up with the chimney to shelter the workmen from the elements. This will be taken down when the chimney is finished. The ground progress is being made on the ground floor and the partitions for the dehydrator are about complete. Upstairs where the offices and the rest rooms and cloak rooms for the staff will be still unfinished. The 15 h.p. steam boiler is in the cellar but is not erected yet. However they expect to have steam up in a week or ten days. The dehydrator is expected to be in operation in March.

News Briefs

EDMONTON, Feb. 3 (CP) - The Edmonton Journal today reported that an oil drilling and road building program on a vast scale, representing an outlay of several hundred thousand dollars, is projected for the northwest territories this year.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 3 (CP) - The Vancouver Sun in a newspaper story from Ottawa today said that Arthur MacNamara, Chief of Selective Service, had issued new orders restricting the drafting of farm workers in the armed services.

VALETTA, Malta, Feb. 3 (CP) - The Air Vice-Marshal R. K. Park, air officer commanding in the Mediterranean, said today that fighter squadrons and anti-aircraft guns on Malta had destroyed 915 Axis planes in 1942 against a loss of only 195 British planes and 106 pilots.

OTTAWA, Feb. 3 (CP) - Delegates attending the 21st annual meeting of the Canadian Horticultural Council here today appealed for a definite statement upon the classification of farmers as essential to the war effort or otherwise, and expressed the opinion that the present deferment regulations are unsatisfactory, since a farmer is obliged to apply periodically for further deferment from military service.

LONDON, Feb. 3 (CP) - The great Russian victory at Stalingrad was such that "the German army is not likely to be in a position to halt this winter," M. Viktorov, a Soviet radio commentator, said tonight in a Moscow broadcast recorded here.

LONDON, Feb. 4 (Thursday) (CP) - A Reuters News Agency dispatch from Ankara, Turkey today quoted a Berlin report that the Finnish Minister had told the Germans that unless Finland gets urgently-needed food supplies she will be obliged to consider the possibility of making a separate peace with Russia.

OTTAWA, Feb. 3 (CP) - Science students in Canadian Universities are to be required by National Selective Service to complete a form declaring whether or not they are prepared to go on active service in technical work at the completion of their course, it was stated here today.

Students who have not reached their graduation year will have to obtain work permits to take summer employment. To assist in placing them in essential work where the services of their kind are most needed, a list now is being prepared of jobs available for science students. The students will be allowed to accept these jobs or other approved positions.

BRACKEN (Continued from page 1) Mon. Sectional and group misunderstandings have too seldom been met with frankness.

There are two reasons, he said, for a policy of economic and military co-operation with other states: "The wider the area of such co-operation, the greater potential prosperity of those affected; the closer and more widespread the economic and understanding of different nations, the greater the prospect of avoiding war."

The question of avoiding war raised that of assuring peace. "The days of old wars were three plagues, the prospect of which brought fear to the hearts of men - war, hunger and pestilence. In the days to come we must banish all three, for we wish this war and take steps to win the peace that will follow it."

Many things were involved in winning the peace, said Mr. Bracken making his first public speech in eastern Canada. He said that an international police force would not come again and restoration of international trade would be a barrier against war.

Farmers, he asserted, "don't want handouts from the state. They want market at fair prices for their products. Having that is a fair relationship to exist between the prices of what they sell and the prices of what they buy and have to pay for, including labor."

Canada's agricultural problem could be adjusted in a way that would be in the best interests of Canada as a whole.

"What is best for Canada as a whole should determine what is good for any part of it - and ought to be so accepted in Canada as to be a nation and not just a collection of warring factions, each trying to benefit itself at the expense of the rest."

Canada had demonstrated in two great wars that when a cause was great enough she could pay whatever price was required to face a major issue. But when there was no such issue she fell into the position of a state without a positive direction, "the population as a whole lacking sufficient urge to unite in the pursuit of those national objectives that should be the primary purpose of a modern state."

ARRIVES OVERSEAS - Word has been received by Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred Campbell of Burlington, of the safe arrival overseas of their son, Leading Aircraftman Norris Campbell, R.C.A.F. During a recent tour through his home town he was honored by a large gathering of his friends and neighbors of Irishtown and vicinity, who presented him with a generous purse and an address book containing the names of his friends in his own country. After a pleasant evening spent and a hearty welcome to his home, he is expected to be returned before the end of the week and a safe return to the homeland when the war is over.

LOCAL RATION BOARD MEETS - Yesterday the Local Ration Board was held yesterday afternoon at 2.30 in the City Council Chamber. The possibility of using the Sporting Club as the centre of distribution books in day-time and of using the bus terminal in the evenings is being investigated, and reports on the matter will be submitted at the next meeting. Mrs. J. A. MacDonald and Miss G. Sterns are preparing a list of names of ladies in Charlottetown who will volunteer to act as clerks of the ration books and to be returned before the end of the week. His Worship Mayor B. Roy Holman presided at yesterday's meeting.

NUTRITION COMMITTEE MEETS - Plans were made for giving a course of lectures on nutrition to the city teachers, at the meeting of the Nutrition Committee held yesterday afternoon at Red Cross House. The substance of these lectures, given by home economists, would be held in the afternoon at the schools. Plans were also made for giving lectures on nutrition to the student teachers at P.W.C. in conjunction with the lectures of Public Health given by Dr. Keatinge. Mr. H. Reginald MacDonald, General Secretary of the P.E.I. Teachers' Federation was present at yesterday's meeting. Dr. B. C. Keatinge, the President was in the chair.

U.S. Reduces Coffee Ration

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3 (AP) - The office of Price Administration today reduced the next coffee ration from one pound every five weeks to one pound every six weeks.

(In Canada one ounce of tea or four ounces of coffee a week a person may be purchased. Rationing coupons may be used for either tea or coffee, but both can not be purchased for the one person in one week.)
