SHANGHAI, Dec. 16.—Reports of the capture of Hangchow, capital of Chekiang province and one of the approaches to Shanghai, by the Cantonese were confirmed here today. ### U. S. FARMERS KEEP MOVING TO CANADA

OTTAWA, Dec. 16.—Movement of United States farm settlers to Canada continues active, notwithstanding the lateness of the season, according to a statement issued today by the department of immigration and colonization.

During November the Canadian government agency at Fargo, N.D., forwarded 123 settlers and seven cars of effects, compared with 50 settlers and four cars of effects in November, 1925. For the same month the agency at Kansas City reports an increase from four settlers in 1925 to 46 in 1926. Detroit agency sent 60 settlers in November, an increase of 200 per cent. over November, a year ago.

The department of immigration and colonization maintains 17 agencies in the United States, and forecasts point to a very active spring immigration from that country.
