THE NEW MARKET BUILDING.

The City Council will meet this evening and it is expected that the plans for the new Market Building will be submitted for approval, suggestion or amendment. We have not seen these plans, but we venture to suggest to our respected City Fathers that before reaching a definite conclusion in regard to the matter it would be well to afford the general public an opportunity for inspection of the plans and of suggesting changes or improvements if necessary. A number of our leading citizens have decided views as to certain objects that ought to be provided for in a building of this kind apart from the main business of buying and selling country produce. In the old building we had a public hall. The feeling is that in the new building a room or rooms should be provided for a public library and for the museum of the Natural History and Antiquarian Society.

Both these objects are of civic and provincial importance. A public library we must have at some time in the not distant future. One of our late public spirited citizens, the late Hon. T. W. Dodd, has left a bequest of five thousand dollars towards this worthy object. Some time ago a subscription list was partially circulated and signed by many leading citizens for a like object. The Natural History Museum is in its very nature allied to the library as a disseminator of useful information especially relating to our own Island. The two could be housed together or in adjoining rooms, and nothing could be more fitting than that they should be provided for in the upper portion of the substantial new and centrally located Market Building about to be erected. By making such provision in the plans of the new structure most useful public objects may be served at the least possible cost. And until the library is established the room would be a very useful one for meetings of various kinds for important public purposes where no very large attendance would be expected.

Our citizens have had reason to congratulate themselves on the progressive and public spirited attitude taken by our present Council on many matters affecting our civic welfare. And so far they have met the crisis caused by the destruction of the old Market Building with a promptness and business like decision and discretion that left nothing to be desired. It is therefore with the more confidence that we expect the Council to provide in the new building for the largest measure of public utility and convenience which can be attained without unduly increasing the cost. There is yet time enough to decide upon the plans without delaying the work of construction and we trust that a full and free consultation may be had before the ultimate decision is reached, always bearing in mind the importance of the special objects above pointed out. It may be that a very little alteration in the plans already prepared will be necessary to carry out what so many citizens earnestly desire in that regard.

BOY DRAWN INTO CARDING MACHINE.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Feb. 5.—George Bjarbeau, 17 years old, of 54 Huntington avenue, in the Olneyville district, a card helper in the Atlantic mill No. 2, Tuesday afternoon from some unknown cause, fell into the cards and was carried forward by the powerful mechanism into the space between the cylinder and the rolls less than 12 inches across. When discovered, his body had been horribly crushed and mangled. Nobody saw the boy fall and he was not missed by his fellow-employees.

THE FRUIT GROWERS' MEETING.

All interested in the development of fruit growing in Prince Edward Island should make it a point to attend the meetings in Kindergarten Hall in this city tomorrow morning, afternoon and evening. As will be seen by the program in another column the morning meeting will include the reports of the various districts by President, Rev. Father Burke. At the afternoon meeting a number of our best local authorities are to read papers on horticultural subjects in which they are possessed of special knowledge and experience, to be followed by addresses by Prof. Robertson, Prof. McKinnon and Prof. Macoun of Ottawa, Prof. Zurlis of Guelph and Harold Jones of Maitland, Ont. At the evening meeting His Worship the Mayor will deliver an address of welcome, to be followed by short salutatory addresses from His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, Premier A. Peter, Commissioner B. Rogers, Mr. Farquharson, M. P. and others. And those who may not have been present in the afternoon will still have the opportunity of hearing from the distinguished visitors from abroad. A show of winter fruit will add to the interest of the meeting. The program is admirably arranged and does credit to those who prepared it and provided so rich a treat for all who may attend. We trust that the meeting may, as we believe it will give a strong stimulus to the popular interest in fruit growing.

Signor Marconi was recently interviewed in New York in regard to the claim of Prof. Braun of Berlin who proclaims that he has discovered a superior method of producing electric energy of unlimited volume in a single direction through the air. Signor Marconi declined to express an opinion as to his claim but suggested that Prof. Braun should show the world what he can do instead of talking about it. Incidentally Mr. Marconi mentioned that his messages are not interfered with by other electrical currents to any appreciable extent, that he is able to secure a full measure of accuracy in transmission and is able to send three messages at the same time for a very distance required. With improved appliances he will hereafter, he says, be able to increase the number of messages transmitted and received at the same time by the wireless system.
