C. P. R. Has Placed Contracts For Two New Steamers

LONDON, June 18.—The Canadian Press has learned that the Canadian Pacific Railway has placed contracts for the construction of two class "M" vessels for the North Atlantic trade. The Clyde Shipbuilding firm of John Brown and Son, and William Beardmore and Company, were awarded the contracts.

In dimension the new ships are to be 585 feet between the perpendiculars, 75 feet in the beam and 27 feet in the draught. They will each have accommodations for 1,600 passengers and a cargo capacity of 4,000 tons.

It is anticipated that the ships will be put into service in the early part of 1928. The contract prices were not announced.

Important Resolution by King's Co. Board of Trade

At a meeting of the Central Kings Board of Trade held at Georgetown, P. E. I., June 11th, 1926 the following resolution was unanimously passed:

To the Honorable the Minister of Public Works.

WHEREAS in the Province of Prince Edward Island the growing of Seed Potatoes has during the past few years reached very large proportions and has now greatly outgrown the transportation facilities available, necessitating the employment of large steamships to move this product to markets during the short period available between the harvesting of the crop and the close of navigation, which period can be extended at least one month by the enlarging and frost-proofing of the present warehouse on the Government Wharf at Georgetown, which wharf and warehouse have been recently put in splendid shape by your Department.

AND WHEREAS the frost-proofing of this warehouse would be not only of incalculable benefit to the potato growers of this Province, but would also be a means of large revenue to the Province, which would offset not only the original outlay but also the cost of the suggested frost-proofing.

AND WHEREAS heavy financial losses to the shippers and producers was only averted in the Fall of 1925 by exceptionally mild weather conditions while hundreds of cars unprotected from frost were loaded with seed potatoes were standing on tracks in Charlottetown, awaiting the arrival of steamships with no available warehouse room for the unloading and protecting from frost of their contents which would have been greatly relieved by the proposed protection and shipping facilities at Georgetown.

AND WHEREAS, notwithstanding the proposed increase of warehouse and wharf facilities at Charlottetown which will be of great benefit to all concerned, the transportation facilities will still be inadequate and will need the proposed work at Georgetown inasmuch as navigation closes at Charlottetown at least one month earlier than it does at Georgetown during which time the most favorable prices can be obtained as the arrival in Southern markets of late shipments of seed potatoes which reach the ultimate purchaser at a time when he is in a position to make quick sales without heavy transportation and storage charges.

AND WHEREAS the proposed improvements at Georgetown have the endorsement of the Potato Growers' Association of the whole island and it is felt that the matter is not one of local interest, but as a necessity vital to the whole Province.

THEREFORE RESOLVED that this Board of Trade urges on your Department the advisability and necessity of placing a sufficient amount in the supplementary estimates to enable your Department to proceed with the work so that it will be completed in time to handle this season's crop.
