London Letter

THE OFFICE OF HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR CANADA IN LONDON WEEK BY WEEK. 23rd SEPTEMBER, 1926. Trade Inquiries.

The High Commissioner's Office has been informed by the Canadian Trade Commissioners in Great Britain that they have received the following enquiries for Canadian goods during the past week.

Wooden Saw Handles - A London firm of importers and manufacturers who are in a position to export Wood-Saw Handles regularly and in quantity.

Hardware, etc. A London dealer in hardware, for four branches in South Africa, is open to receive offers from Canadian manufacturers when in the country.

Food Products - A London firm, with branches at Glasgow, Aberdeen, and Dundee, is prepared to accept wholesale orders for food products.

The number is designed as a National Emblem and is the design of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who gave their lives in the Great War.

Interest in the recent General Election was shown by both Canadian and English visitors. In order to meet the stream of enquiries the High Commissioner's Office issued a short booklet giving the latest news and figures.

The revaluation of the funds of the "Empress of Ireland" Relief Fund which was completed some time ago has resulted in increased weekly allowances being granted to Canadian relief workers.

Three shipments of Canadian Store Cattle arrived at Liverpool on September 15th and 22nd September. It is reported that all the animals landed in good condition.

The outbreak of foot and mouth disease reported at Liverpool on September 19th appears to be subsiding, and if no further trouble occurs the trade in Canadian cattle at Birkenhead will resume its normal course.

The Handy Man's Corner

A FITTED HANGING CUPBOARD. Now-a-days the wardrobe is giving place to the fitted cupboard, and in the article it is proposed to deal with the construction of one measuring 4 ft. high, 3 ft. 6 inches wide and 18 inches deep.

The handyman will not find anything very difficult in the construction of this wardrobe. There are no difficult joints. Stated briefly, the work consists of first making a light skeleton of framework and attaching to it a number of sheets of plywood.

The materials needed are 60 ft. of 1 inch square, three sheets of plywood about 3 ft. 6 inches thick and 50 inches square, and two pieces of plywood at least 3 ft. 6 inches thick and 18 inches wide.

The first business is to make the framework, cutting the 1 inch square wood to the appropriate lengths as shown in the diagram. Fig. 2, and then nailing or screwing them together to form the skeleton of the cupboard.

Now cut the plywood sheets to correct size, which will normally be exact outside size of the frames they are to cover. Clean up the edges of the plywood by cutting them with a sharp knife.
