

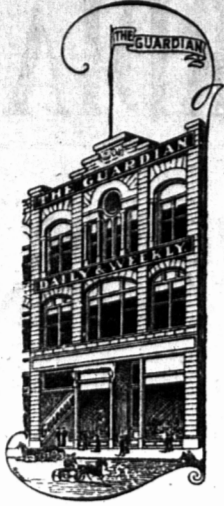

INHUMAN WAR

M. Jean Norel, writing to Le Courrier Europeen of Paris, calls attention to one phase of the war in the east which deserves not to be overlooked. In the attacks that were made upon the fortifications around Port Arthur these were in a large number of cases resisted by the use of what were termed hand grenades—that is, small bombs filled with dynamite—which were thrown over the fortifications so that they exploded among the Japanese, who were perhaps either in the ditch surrounding the fort, or endeavoring to scale its walls. In the report of the taking of 299 Metre Hill the statement was made:

The long lines of dead Japanese, ranged on the side of the hill before being buried, offered a horrible spectacle. The greater part of them were unrecognizable in consequence of the mutilations that had been inflicted upon them by the explosion of hand grenades of dynamite.

It seems to be the opinion of the writer whose comments we are quoting that hand grenades of this kind have not been used in war by civilized nations for quite a number of years past until this employment was made of them by the Russians in their defence of Port Arthur. There is, he says, a singular irony to be found in the exclusive use of these weapons by the nation whose government on the 11th of December, 1898, wrote to all of the European powers to obtain their concurrence in what was known as the protocol of St. Petersburg. This international agreement read as follows:

Considering that the progress of civilization should have for its effect the amelioration as far as possible of the calamities of war; that the only legitimate end that states should propose for themselves during a war is the enfeeblement of the military forces of the enemy; that to that effect it would suffice to place out of combat the greatest possible number of men; that this end would be surpassed by the employment of weapons which uselessly aggravate the sufferings of men beyond the time of combat, or render their death inevitable; that the employment of such weapons is contrary to the laws of humanity;

The contracting parties pledge themselves to mutually renounce, in case of war between themselves, the employment by their armies and navies of projectiles having a weight of less than 400 grammes which are explosive or are charged with fulminating or inflammable substances.

To the statement which might be made, that these hand grenades used by the Russians at Port Arthur may weigh 450 grammes or more, and also that Japan was not among the number of the powers that signed the international agreement referred to, it is further pointed out by M. Norel that the declaration of Brussels adopted Aug. 27, 1874, which was of general application, contained the following interdiction in its 13th article:

The employment of weapons, projectiles or materials which cause superfluous loss, in accordance with the usage of projectiles prohibited by the declaration of St. Petersburg.

This Brussels prohibition was general in its character, and was signed on the part of Russia by Baron Jomini, Gen. Leer, and that distinguished Russian

diplomatist, Dr. Martens. But in spite of this official utterance, arms which were calculated to blow men to pieces rather than incapacitate them were freely employed by the Russians in their hopeless defence of this Manchurian stronghold.—Boston Herald.

CHAPLAIN DISMISSED.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Chaplain Joseph F. MacGrail has been dismissed from the navy by order of the president. He was tried by court martial on the Asiatic station on the charge of scandalous conduct. A Roman Catholic priest will be appointed in his place.

Tenders for Conveying Children.

Sealed Tenders will be received by the undersigned until January 12th, 1905, for the conveyance of school children to the McDonnell Consolidated School at Hillsboro (Mount Heriot) every day the school is in session, between the dates May 1st, 1905 and Dec 31st, 1905, inclusive.

Route No. 1. Hazelbrook extends from the late Michael McDonald's along the Lot 45 Road via McKenzie's Corner to the school.

Route No. 2. From Bethel by nearest road to school.

Route No. 3. From Mermaid by nearest road to school.

Route No. 4. From Bunbury by nearest road to school.

Route No. 5. Extends from Mr. Dan McKee's, Tea Hill via Cross Roads to Mr. Frank Ferguson's.

Route No. 6. Extends from the last house in Kinlock (McLennan's) to Cross Roads, also conveying pupils on the route east of Mr. Frank Ferguson's.

The tender must be marked "Tender for Route No. —" (Place number of route in space) and must be addressed to J. Walter Jones, Box 49, Charlottetown, or left with Mr. Franklin Boyer, Bunbury.

The tender must state cost per day for conveying the pupils to and from the school.

CONDITIONS

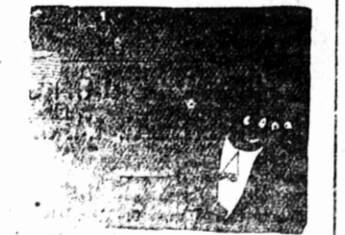
1. Drivers will be required to sign a contract.
2. The contractor will be supplied with a van.
3. The contractor must furnish horse or horses, lap robes and harness.
4. The driver shall wait not longer than two minutes at a collecting point for children.
5. Vans will pass along the main road in each district.
6. No pupils over school age shall be conveyed in vans.
7. No children over twelve years of age, who reside within one and a half miles of school shall be conveyed in vans.
8. All other children who reside more than one mile from the school to be conveyed.

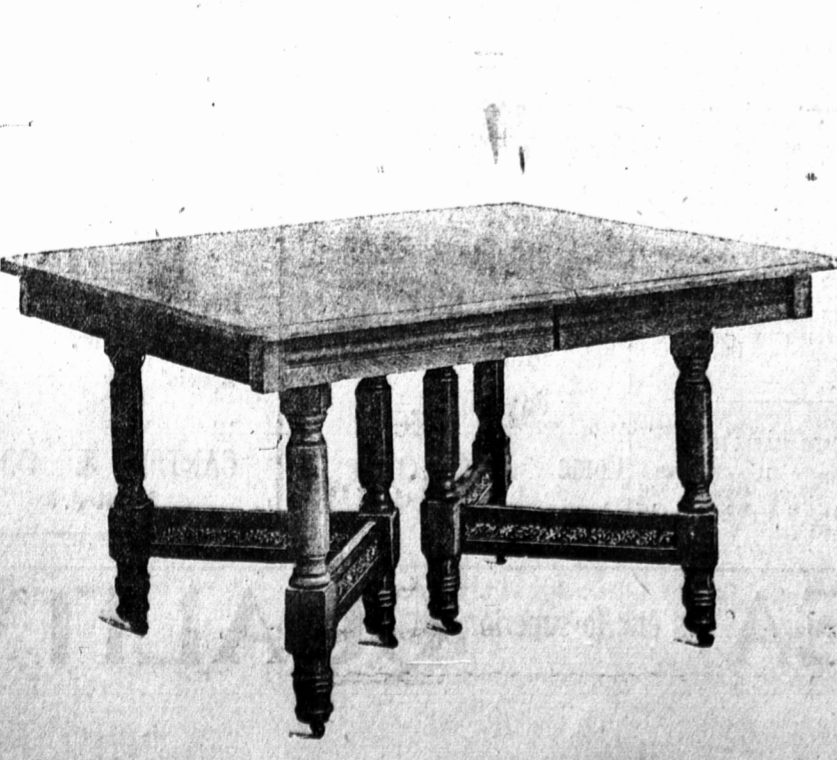
