CHINESE QUEETS MUST BE WELL DISINFECTED.

OTTAWA, Jan. 29.—Following the revolution in China the cutting of queues, and the consequent abundance of human hair for trade purposes, Canadian quarantine regulations are being tightened. An Order-in-Council has been issued requiring that human or other hair unmanufactured or uncleaned, must be packed and disinfected in a steamer of boiling water, before it is allowed to enter Canada. The quarantine officers are also required to make strict enquiry as to the presence of unmanufactured or uncleaned hair in coming cargoes.

SMALL ENGAGEMENTS OF TURKS AND ITALIANS.

TRIPOLI, Jan. 29.—The Turkish forces yesterday resumed their movement against Ghirgarish, a small oasis about twelve miles from Tripoli, which has been the scene of recent numerous engagements between the Turks and Italians; and, at the same time, another force of Turks and Arabs delivered a determined attack on Arusa some miles inland. A heavy Italian artillery fire compelled the assaulting forces to fall back towards the south and southwest. The Italian casualties were two killed and eight wounded.

900 FISHERMEN DRIFTING ON ICE.

HOLINGFORD, Finland, Jan. 29.—Nine hundred fishermen are drifting on a gigantic floe, between Narva and the Pitkapaasi Islands. Danger to the men is not imminent unless a storm breaks from the north.

WARSHIP WANTED.

PERIM ARABIA, Jan. 29.—The British Consul, Hoida, has sent a request to his Government for the despatch of a warship to this port. His action is due to threats by the Italian vessels to bombard the town.

TO TOUR THE WEST

WINNIPEG, Jan. 25.—The highly satisfactory announcement that His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught will pay an official visit to Western Canada in the fall of this year was forthcoming yesterday morning, when Mr. D. E. Sprague, on behalf of the Exhibition Board, was interviewing the Board of Control with a view of arranging for joint reception arrangements when the Duke comes to Winnipeg, as already promised, to open the exhibition.

Mr. Sprague, who has just returned from Ottawa, said that Col. Lowther, of the vice-regal staff, said that the exhibition trip was in the nature of a special trip only, undertaken in view of the importance of the Selkirk centennial, and that the royal party will make an extended official visit to the West later on. The details will be announced later.

PRAIRIE LIBERALS AFTER FREE TRADE.

OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—The Prairie Liberals pursued their free trade policy today. Some time after the present Minister of Customs assumed office he became aware that American lumbermen were importing as rough lumber and therefore, free, a type of lumber, first planned and then artificially roughened on the planed surfaces. He sent the matter to the Board of Customs and received from a ruling that the lumber was dutiable. The Liberals made an outcry in the subject a while ago and were let the foregoing statement of the facts.

Today the Prairie Liberals returned to the attack and on a motion to into supply Mr. Turriff moved that the Minister of Customs in collecting duties on lumber planned as stated was violating the Customs act and was unduly and illegally imposing a heavy tax on the people. The debate thus ran until a late hour in the evening. Mr. Turriff, Mr. Thompson and Mr. Knowles accused the British Columbia lumbermen of being in a combine and said that the price of lumber had been enhanced to the settler on the prairies. Mr. Goodwin, Mr. Stevens and Mr. Taylor repudiated the charge. The main point of the Conservative reply was a denial of the allegation that actual prices to the actual settler have been enhanced.

Sir Wilfred Laurier spoke about 3.30 o'clock, urging that the Board of Customs is subordinate to the Minister, and all saying that its decisions represent his desire and not his independent opinion. Continuing, he became completely mixed up in technical details as to the planing, sawing, jointing, tonguing and grooving of lumber, causing his House great amusement. Mr. Borden followed. Sir Wilfred Laurier and Mr. Oliver rejoined. Dr. Reid closed the debate with an effective speech in which he showed that the amendment was dishonestly worded, inasmuch as no duties have been collected on lumber of the sort described in the amendment. He also showed that the board of customs showed great liberality in meeting the views of importers of lumber, exceeding nearly all their claims. The house divided at midnight, the amendment being rejected by 107 to 72.

the late Dr. Thomas Clay, an army surgeon, well and favorably known. The late Mr. Clay was born in the city of Bodman in Cornwall, in a house now in perfect preservation, though standing for upwards of 500 years, and long in use before Cromwell's time. Mr. Clay has one brother living, Charles Clay, one of the most prosperous farmers in this part of the country, doing his work on purely scientific principles, and though never a robust man, by dint of industry and perseverance succeeded in a marked manner. He is the senior of his late brother by several years, and though broken down by affliction the mind is unimpaired, and can talk on any subject, with marked intelligence—a well stored mind, a grand reasoner—ever reminding one of the Scriptural text, "To him that hath shall be given, and he shall have more abundantly." Another brother who has joined the great majority, was the Reverend Doctor Edwin Clay, late immigration agent at Halifax. A renowned physician and one of the greatest surgeons in the Maritime Provinces, and certainly the most magnetic personality that we have ever listened to in a pulpit. On the 9th of January, 1871, two more brothers, and a brother-in-law, were lost at sea—Darius D. Clay, Henry Clay, Capt. Saville, Capt. Currie, Dugald McDonald, and the steward of the vessel. The schooner Emiline, owned and built by the Clays at Dundas, was coming from Bay of Islands, Nfld., when on the 9th of January, 1871, a terrific gale and snow-storm was raging, and though no light was shown at the East Point Light, and the night a dreadful one, the vessel made straight for the light-house. She had two able men on board—Capt. Currie, Capt. Saville and Capt. Currie—and, it is thought, struck East Point Ledge,

and was dismantled. Only one of the crew, Dugald McDonald, near here, was found next spring at Little Harbor and interred at St. George's. A more affectionate lot of boys to one another could not be found, and the affliction of that night ever after was keenly felt by the family and by none more than by the late Thos. Clay, who was completely prostrated over the calamity. Mr. Clay was a self-educated man. He studied and digested the proper arrangement and connection of words and the deeper meaning of expression. After the death of the lamented William McDonald, then of Georgetown, Mr. Clay was appointed in his stead as Superintendent of Public Works, and being himself a master workman, did his work like an Englishman to stand the test of time. A very useful man in the community, he was ever ready to visit the sick and help them by his skill and counsel. He was a most kind neighbor and delighted to do a favor or an act of kindness. He was a man of truth and spoke as he felt and felt as he spoke. He was a strong temperance man but never made that a hobby. A religious man, without cant or hypocrisy—but he acted all these in "silent speech" in the life he lived and now that heart, though sometimes differently operated upon, by different operators, has at length passed the stern analysis of death, to hear the welcome, "Well done, good and faithful servant," which we do assuredly believe—we mourn not as those who have no hope. He leaves to mourn, Gustavus Adolphus, merchant, at Dundas, Alaric of the United States, and Mrs. Farquharson—Bessie at home; also Miss Rowena who came home lately to see her parents. The funeral cortege was large, considering the cold day, and the remains were interred beside father and mother, and a cenotaph erected to the memory of departed brothers. The stone erected over this empty tomb contains the words—say they truly are! "Erected to the memory of Capt. Edw. Saville and his two brothers-in-law Darius D. and Harry Clay, who were lost at sea off East Point Jan. 9, 1871, owing to the culpable apathy of the then government in neglecting to keep the lights in the light-house burning." Rev. Mr. Harwood and M. N. McLeod officiated. Tell us we dead, will none of you in pity disclose to us this secret, what is it ye are and we must be.
