## ALLIES ADVANCE 75 MILES PER DAY ON TUNISIA

### Report Hitler Offers France Peace Terms

Story is unconfirmed; Laval heard offer at Munich Meeting.

LONDON, Nov. 12—(AP)—Hitler's terms for immediate peace with Vichy, restoring to France all her 1939 continental territory except Alsace and Lorraine, were carried to Vichy by arch-collaborationist Pierre Laval from his Munich meeting with the Fuehrer, it was reported tonight in reliable continental circles with close Vichy connections.

The report was not confirmed.

The reported provisions, especially that involving the loss to the French of the two provinces, probably would prove decidedly distasteful and unacceptable to the whole French nation.

The cardinal terms of the proposed peace as reported by those informed sources, which could not be further identified, are—

1. France would retain all her continental area except the provinces of Alsace and Lorraine, which would be returned to Germany.
2. Alsace and Lorraine would be incorporated into the Reich.
3. France would keep her empire (currently all of which now is controlled or allied with the United Nations).
4. The French fleet would be divided between the Germans to reorganize the Empire.
5. Italy would renounce territorial claims on France.

The Italians in the past have relied loudly for Nice, Tunisia and Corsica, but an Italian spokesman

### War Situation Last Night

Mounting evidence that the developing Anglo-American squeeze play in Africa has already shattered both prongs of Hitler's most ambitious "pincer" attack of the war comes from many sources even before full fruits of Allied strategy can be assessed.

Certainly the southern jaw of the Axis vise is wrecked. Nothing remains of Rommel's African Corps in Egypt except its casualties in men and machines. The Suez Canal and the eastern Mediterranean are again secure.

Darlan requests Toulon Commanders To take ships to Africa; French swing To side of Allies.

LONDON, Nov. 13—(Friday)—(AP)—A powerful Allied striking force advancing at a 75-mile-a-day clip early today was nearing the frontier of Tunisia where reports said the Nazis had landed at least 2,000 men by air in an expanding effort to hold that strategic Mediterranean corner now under R.A.F. assault from the opposite direction.

### Orphaned Vichy Fleet Remains Off Toulon

Germans stop short of big Naval Base while Angling for control of 62 warships at stake.

LONDON, Nov. 12—(AP)—The curious and Vichy French fleet lay with guns uncovered and steam up tonight off Toulon, the last remaining bit of unoccupied France as the United Nations and the Axis vied feverishly behind the scenes and openly on the air waves for its control.

### Deal Japs Heavy Blow

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Australia, Nov. 13—(Friday)—(AP)—Allied bombers have dealt a heavy blow at the Japanese base of Buna-Paisi in the North Solomons, the High Command said today. The raid was the second in as many days on a base where recently the Allied bombers sank or damaged more than a score of ships, including an aircraft carrier.
