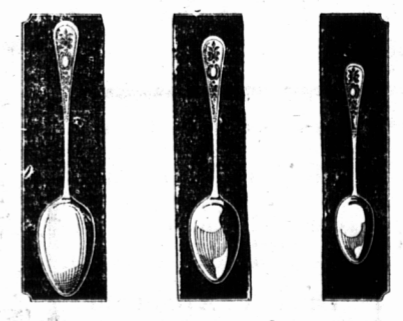

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ITALIAN BRUSH TRADE. Although there is some importation of brushes into Italy, the bulk of the trade is in hands of domestic producers, writes A. B. Mudimar, Canadian Trade Commissioner in Milan, in the forthcoming issue of the Commercial Intelligence Journal. A limited quantity of the more expensive English brushes are purchased, but the bulk of the imports are cheap German brushes. It would be difficult for Canadian manufacturers to introduce their products with the exception perhaps of paint brushes and shaving brushes.
