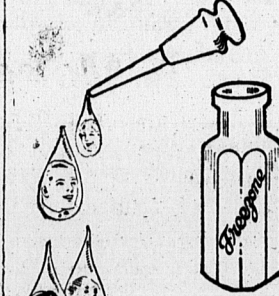

THE WAR MEMORIALS.—The War Memorials attracted quite a large number to the market building yesterday where the splendid pictures were viewed with a great deal of interest. The exhibit was brought to a close last evening at 6 o'clock. Many people have expressed the hope that the memorials will again be placed on view in the city as a great number were unable to find the necessary time to attend the exhibition. In presenting this unique collection of War Memorials in photographic form to the people of Prince Edward Island, the promoter endeavored, as far as possible, to fully cover the ground of the portions in which our people are most directly interested. All, or about all, of the units, Batteries, and Contingents that enlisted in the Province of Prince Edward Island, and left for overseas service, were presented. In this connection were shown many of the towns and villages and other areas in Flanders and France, in which our soldiers were either engaged in battle, stopped at or passed through. The destruction caused by the ravages and devastations of the awful Hun, places of historic interest and widespread fame were given in this collection. These places and scenes are all familiar to the boys of Prince Edward Island, who have seen active service at the front. The collection was the greatest and most complete of the Island's part in the Great War that has ever been given to our people in pictorial form. Thus in this collection was presented to the people of this Province a pictorial history of the part taken by the Island boys in the great conflict and although the descriptive matter was necessarily short, the pictures themselves tell the story through the eye better perhaps than it would be told through the pen.
