Call for tenders for Steamship Service Between Quebec and Natashquan

TENDERS for a Passenger, Freight and Mail Steamship Service are invited and will be received at the office of the Minister of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa, until noon of the Fifteenth day of December, 1913.

Tenders must be submitted on the printed form for that purpose which will be supplied on application to the undersigned and are to be sent in sealed envelopes addressed to "The Hon. the Minister of Trade and Commerce" and are to be marked "Tenders for Steamship Service Between Quebec and Natashquan" and if submitted through the post should be registered.

The service is to consist of regular sailings from Quebec to Natashquan and return as follows: Every 10 days from such date as the ice conditions in the River St. Lawrence will permit up to May 15th; every 7 days from May 15th to November 15th; and every 10 days from November 15th until the ice conditions in the River St. Lawrence will no longer permit of the running of a steamer over the said route.

The Ports of Call each way shall be as follows: Les Escoumins, Manicouagan, Godbout, Point Des Monts, Tricity Bay, Seven Islands, Molise, Sheldrake, Thunder River, Magpie, River St. John, Long Point, Mingan and Escoumins Point, or such reasonable modification or variation thereof as may be determined from time to time by the Minister.

The contract to be for a period of five years from the opening of navigation as above described in the year 1914.

The contractor is to land and embark mails at all Ports of Call at his own cost and expense.

The tenders shall be subject to such conditions as are incidental to all similar contracts.

The Minister does not bind himself to accept the lowest or any tender.

C.P.R. WILL NOT ENTER THE POOL

LONDON, Nov. 5.—(Special).—Emphatic denial is given here of the allegations in a Vienna newspaper to the effect that negotiations have been proceeding between the Canadian Pacific and the Austro-American Steamship Company, with the object of admitting the Canadian Pacific steamships to the North Atlantic pool.

The story was to the effect that under the arrangements proposed the Canadian Pacific would be permitted to continue under the Austrian concession, while the pool would meet the requirements of the Austrian Government with regard to emigration. The Vienna paper also referred to the intention of Herr Ballia, managing director of the North German Lloyd line, of conferring with the Austrian Government on behalf of the German interests.

In relating the story the Canadian Pacific officials point out that the terms of their concession from the Austrian Government require them to inform the authorities of any other negotiations entered into, and the company has always fulfilled their obligation.

GREECE RECEIVES COLLECTIVE NOTE

ROME, Nov. 5.—(Special).—The collective note presented to Greece by Italy and Austria, it is announced here, was due to Greek reluctance in refusing to yield to the advice of the administrator at Vienna and Rome and continued to hamper the work of the international commission engaged in delimiting the territory of Albania.

Italy and Austria acted according to instructions from the Powers, which are anxious that the Greece-Albanian frontier question be settled in accordance with the decision of the London conference. Greece, it is charged, interfered in all ways with the labors of the commission, and in notifying the Greek government that they have instructed their representatives on the commission to regard as Albanian all villages where opposition is encountered Italy and Austria have the support of the other Powers, although, it is said, some of them gave it reluctantly.
