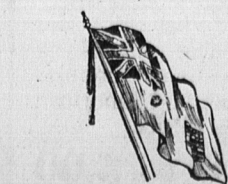
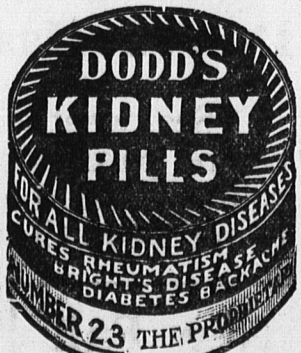

ENORMOUS LOSSES SUSTAINED BY TURKS AT THE DARDANELLES.

ROME, Sept. 9.—The Corriere D'Italia has received a letter from Athens, in which it is stated that the total losses of the Turks in the Dardanelles are estimated at 250,000 men. Armenian refugees relate that 70,000 Armenians have been massacred, including several deputies of the Turkish Parliament. Everyone in Constantinople knows that the bankruptcy of Turkey is imminent. Agents and functionaries of the police are devoting themselves entirely to plundering. German officers are becoming alarmed and discouraged and are demanding that they be sent back to Germany, to fight for their native land.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER UNDERGOES OPERATION

OTTAWA, Sept. 9.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier is to-night reported to be resting easily in his room at the Water Street Hospital after an operation performed this morning to remove a molar abscess on his lower jaw. The operation lasted some forty minutes, during which time Sir Wilfrid was under the influence of anaesthetics. He bore the ordeal well, and the operation, which was performed by Dr R. Chevrier and Dr Martin of Ottawa, was a complete success. Sir Wilfrid will remain in the hospital for two or three days while the wound heals, and after that he may be obliged to remain in his residence for a few days longer. The mark of the incision, which was from the outside, will probably remain with him for the rest of his life.

GERMAN EXPLANATION DISAPPOINTS PRESIDENT

(Special to The Guardian) WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—The President devoted several hours today to the study of Germany's note on the sinking of the Arabic. He made no official comment but indicated plainly the German explanation was disappointing. The German Ambassador assured Lansing that full satisfaction would be given if it was determined that the German submarine sank the Arabic. Germany's statement that she could not acknowledge any obligation or grant an indemnity was not considered full satisfaction by the officials of this Government. It is understood the United States Government will be willing to submit to the Hague the question how much indemnity should be paid but it is improbable that it will consent to arbitrate the principle involved. The answer to Germany is expected to go forward promptly.

RELEASE OF GOODS HELD UP AT NEUTRAL PORTS BY ORDER OF BRITAIN.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—Ambassador Penfield was instructed by cable yesterday that Great Britain is now prepared to accept informal representations by the foreign trade advisers of the state department as a means of releasing American owned goods of German and Austrian origin now held up at neutral ports by the British order-in-council. Details of the plan will be worked out here in the next three or four days. Goods amounting to \$167,000, 000 have been tied up at Rotterdam alone, and it is expected that the new arrangement will release not only these shipments, but all goods of German and Austrian manufacture for American importers who have incurred obligations.

41 NORWEGIAN SHIPS LOST SINCE OUTBREAK OF WAR.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—Forty-one ships, flying the Norwegian flag have been lost since the beginning of the war in Europe, and seventy-six sailors have perished, according to a report, received at the State Department today, from the American Minister at Christiania.

Thirteen ships were destroyed by mines, twenty-four were sunk by torpedoes, three disappeared in the war zone and one was crushed by a German warship, the report stated. Another ship was taken as a prize to Hamburg.

The extensive losses have impelled the Norwegian war risks insurance bureau to increase premiums and adopt additional restrictions. The bureau to date, the report stated, had sustained losses of \$2,600,000, while premiums collected amounted to only \$1,620,000.

Recent losses have been almost entirely due to the torpedoes, the report stated, and suggested that shortage of explosives had resulted in more restricted use of explosive and unsatisfactory mines.
