Doyle, president of the Manitoba Association; Mr. Hancock, President of the Alberta Association; Mr. French, head factor of the Hudson Bay Co. for Canada and Newfoundland; the Deputy Minister of Agriculture for Manitoba and others.

and encourage the spirit of worship. Righteousness and beauty swell with our God and as we seek His righteousness we are encouraged and comforted in our quest by the beautiful. Beauty has several avenues of expression—music, motion, color and form. In the picture, color and form are combined and the effect heightened thereby so much the more. The subject of these pictures will retain their constant lesson and inspiration to the worshippers. The one to the right donated by Mrs. Black represents our Lord in Gethsemane. It is very appropriate thus to have presented to our eyes in this place the truth we are enjoined by the Apostle St. Peter to remember that we are redeemed by the precious blood of Christ even by those great drops that in his agony he sweated there. And the legend "Watch and pray"—the Master's words to His disciples in the garden—are a fitting injunction to us. "Watch" says the soldierly colonel "and pray" adds his gentler partner. The other, in the window presented by Mr. Tweedy—the Resurrection Angel by the Lord's open Tomb with the words, He is Risen" on his lips, strikes the dominant note in all our Christian thought and belief. The Crown of Thorns is laid aside. The Crown of Life replaces it. What comfort and inspiration these beautiful windows will have to us and to the succeeding generations of worshippers here down through the years.

Now a pictured window is significant not only in what it presents, but also in what it suggests. For one thing, it suggests the importance of the point of view. It makes all the difference in the world whether we look at it from within or from without. When we are without the window is but a dark, forbidding and unintelligible thing. But when within in how different,—then it is full of grace and meaning. So is God's treatment of us—the treatment for example meted out to these friends who have suffered such loss. From the earthly side so dark and seemingly hard, but from the heavenly—this is our faith—so full of meaning and of mercy.

Again while we look at it in faith we can look through it in faith, and find that our landscape is transformed, that "Earth is crammed with heaven." Instead of houses and fields and shore we see with the inner eye—and who will say our vision is any the less real—the Spirit of God and His Angels and the glorious company of the redeemed, the martyrs, the fathers and all the heroic and gentle of earth—that great cloud of witnesses—alive, triumphant, beyond the touch of sorrow and death, and able to befriend and defend us in our darkness and distress. In that company of the victorious and glorious—alive are, we believe, these three

whose memories are consecrated in these windows. Colonel and Mrs. Moore worshipped regularly in this church ever since its dedication sixty-four years ago. Both were zealous and faithful Christians. For many years he was a member of the Board of Trustees and for a long time superintendent of the Sunday School. After careers equally honorable and useful, serving their generation according to the will of the Lord, they now rest in Him. Mrs. George J. Tweedy was a daughter of the late Matthew and Mrs. Allan of this city. She was born here on the 29th day of December, 1893, one of a family of four. Her brother Frank, gave his life for his country in the Great War. She was married to Mr. Tweedy on Sept. 26, Beautiful and bright, she is now one of them.

In loving and loyal memory of these the windows are now unveiled. The congregation then stood and turned towards the window. After a pause the minister led in the prayer of consecration:— Our Gracious Father, God, in whose temple strength and beauty abide,—as we approach Thee through Jesus Christ, we offer Thee humble thanks for this House of Prayer and for all the sacred memories that are awakened here of loved ones gone to Glory whose name liveth in loyal hearts for ever. We thank Thee for the proud and triumphant story of our Lord's life on earth, His faithful death, and glorious resurrection pictured in this Sanctuary.

We implore thy comfort and encouragement for all who have loved ones before through the portals of death, and we pray that they may be kept faithful until that morn in which they will see once more those angel faces smile. And now we would dedicate to Thy glory these memorial gifts of Thy children presented for the lifting up of Him who is the desire of all nations, the object of our worship and the source of all our hope. Will thou grant by Thy grace that hearts may be corrected and comforted in looking upon them as Thy people gathered to worship in this house.

And to Thy Holy name with the Son and the Spirit we shall give all the praise through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen. The regular sermon was delivered by Rev. C. N. Brown from the text Psalm 122-1. "I was glad when they said unto me, let us go into the house of the Lord." The choir sang as an anthem, the "Twenty-third Psalm." It was announced that the beautiful flowers on both sides of the altar were donated by relatives and friends in memory of the late John McLaughlin, who died Dec. 18th, 1928.

Memorial Service Last Evening.

In the evening a memorial service was held for the late Reverend Hammond Johnson. Rev. Dr. Ramsay, C. N. Brown and J. M. McLeod, were in the pulpit and took part. The music comprised favorite selections of the deceased. The solo "One sweetly solemn thought," was given by Mr. G. E. Ritchie in his usual artistic manner and the anthem, "Crossing the Bar," to the setting of Professor Fletcher, was greatly appreciated. Professor G. D. Steel read a short sketch of Rev. Mr. Johnson's life and Dr. Ramsay gave the address, taking as his text the words of Revelation 22-4. "His servants shall serve him and they shall see his face and his name shall be in their foreheads." At the close of the service the congregation stood whilst Professor Fletcher played Chopin's "Marche Funebre." Both at the funeral service in Bathurst, and in the Memorial service here the point was emphasized that the late Rev. Mr. Johnson was a man specially endowed to serve the Master he loved so well.

Meets Boy Scouts During Visit

The visit to the Island of Mr. John A. Stiles, Assistant Chief Commissioner for the Boy Scouts of Canada, has been an extremely busy one. Mr. Stiles followed the program announced at the meeting in the City Hall on Wednesday night, the evening of his arrival. Thursday morning with Mr. G. Phillier, he visited Governor Hearst, Chief Patron of the Boy Scouts for the Island. Thursday afternoon Mr. Stiles, with Mr. Currier, his assistant, was present at a meeting of the St. Peter's Cub Pack in which Mr. Dick Phillier, acting cub master, is doing excellent work. Under the excellent tutorage of the latter, the work of the pack has reached a high state of efficiency. Thursday evening, after addressing the Y's Men's Club, Mr. Stiles went to a meeting of the Zion Church Cubs and later to a meeting of the Zion Scouts, both new organizations and both under the leadership of Mr. Clarence Walker. The Cubs and Scouts have both been making splendid progress since their recent beginning. Under the leadership of Mr. Currier, a number of games were enjoyed and an interesting talk was given.

Friday morning Mr. Stiles and Mr. Currier went to Summerside, where they interviewed Mayor Lidstone and a number of the clergymen. Among those present at the meeting held in the Town Hall Friday evening, were Premier Saunders, Hon. A. E. McLean, Mayor Lidstone and Rev. G. T. Spriggs Provincial Commissioner. Mr. Stiles told the Jamboree story, explained what scouting does to the individual and showed how to form troops.

Saturday morning and afternoon were spent in Kensington, in conference with Rev. G. T. Spriggs, relative Mount Royal and Queen Hotels during the stay in Montreal. They were also guests of the C. N. R., in a sight-seeing tour around the city. Mr. Geo. McNamee, Secretary of the Montreal Tourist Bureau and of the Canadian Good Roads Association, whose annual meeting took place in Charlottetown last September, was also present.

Mrs. Arsenault, who accompanied Judge Arsenault to Montreal, was the guest of her cousin, Miss Frankie McDonald, and of her sister, Miss May K. Gallant. Justice Arsenault has been given the first presentation copy of the new Canadian National Hotel, now under construction, the name of which has been recently officially released. The plan was presented by Mr. Pratt, General Manager of the Canadian National Hotel. The building, which is to be a five-storied structure, is to have the portico opening on Kent Street with eight pillars in front. The hotel is also to have a roof garden. With regard to the opening of the hotel, Judge Arsenault said: "It is intended that the hotel be opened about July 1st, when the principal officials of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways, prominent men from Montreal and Toronto, and representatives from New England Railways expect to be present. The hotel will be one of the best advertisements Prince Edward Island has had in late years.
