AGREED TO PAY HIS DOCTOR \$1,000 A DAY

BALTIMORE, March 18—Dr. Lewellyn F. Barker, of the Johns Hopkins Medical School, explained today the claim of \$1,500 for medical services rendered to the late Thomas F. Walsh, of Washington, and Colorado. The claim, with the claims of others, was filed against Mr. Walsh's estate in the probate court at Washington and attracted attention in the newspapers.

"This is," said Dr. Barker, "the biggest bill I ever rendered for any services, and it was perfectly satisfactory to Mr. Walsh's family." "At the time I was called to see Mr. Walsh he was in Texas, and I went to San Antonio. The agreement was made in advance that I was to receive \$1,000 a day for my services, and I was busy some ten days. That made \$10,000." "I also went to Washington a number of times to see Mr. Walsh and spent two nights there. For the visits and attention to him in Washington I charged \$1,500, which made the total \$11,500.

GERMAN SOCIALISTS AGITATE FOR WOMAN SUFFRAGE

BERLIN, March 19—The Socialists organized mass meetings in every city in Germany today in favor of woman suffrage. Those held in Berlin passed off without incident and no disorder. This is the first occasion in which the Socialists of Germany have taken up officially the cause of woman.

SHAKESPEARE'S POEMS SOLD FOR \$163

LONDON, March 18—A first edition of Shakespeare's poems printed in America, was sold at auction here today for \$163. It was printed in Philadelphia in 1796 by Blore and Maden.

DOUBLE TRAGEDY IN ANSONIA CONN.

ANSONIA, Conn., Mar. 19—Thomas Fitzgibbons, sr., and his wife, Nora, were found in their home on Division street late today with their skulls crushed in with an axe and the house being held by the police charged with the double murder, though according to the story told by him to the police, his father killed his mother, and he in turn killed his father.

The son has two slight scalp wounds which he said he received when he took the axe away from his father, but according to the medical examiner, the wounds were probably self-inflicted. The tragedy was discovered by a neighbor, Edward Fogarty, who, attracted by smoke issuing from the windows of the house, entered to find Thomas Jr. hacking the head of his father, who was lying on the kitchen floor, with an axe, and the body of the mother with her skull crushed in upon the floor in a front room.

The house was on fire, set either by a lamp which was on the floor or by a stove which was overturned. Before the bodies could be removed that of the elder Fitzgibbons was badly burned. Fogarty secured the son and held him until the arrival of the police. According to the story told to them by the son, who was released from the state asylum for the insane a year ago, and since that time had been working in Schenectady (N. Y.), he returned home a week ago. His father and mother, he said, frequently quarrelled and today had a particularly violent fight, which led his father to seize the axe which stood in a corner of the kitchen and strike Mrs. Fitzgibbons on the head. The son said he interfered as soon as he could and took the axe from his father and struck him with it, crushing his skull. The fire, he said, was started by the lamp, which his father had thrown at his mother before attacking her with the axe. Fitzgibbons is being held pending the coroner's inquiry.
